BOIVIN (BILL) WILLIAM C. Manager



Bill Boivin or as he is better known as "The Colonel" is in his fourth year as manager of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. Bill has done an outstanding job of scouting and signing players in the United States as the list of imports brought into Canada during the last few years will verify. Bill is also noted for the efficiency with which he handles all players problems and the running of the team.

Bill gained his football experience as a player in High School, Junior and finally Senior teams. He was a fullback with the Bombers when they won the Grey Cup in 1939 and 1943. During the war Bill joined the Winnipeg Light Infantry rising to the rank of Major. He was discharged in 1945 and took over as Lieutenant-Colonel of the W.L.I. in the reserve army. In 1948 Bill became manager of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company Limited.

Bill kept his contact with football by coaching, the Gordon Bell High School team and the W.L.I. team in the junior league until he once again joined the Bombers, this time as manager. Bill is married and has two children.

AUSLEY, JIM Trainer

Jim graduated from the University of Houston, Texas, and was trainer there from 1948 till 1952. He joined the Blue Bombers that year and has been with them ever since.

His record shows that he was assistant Trainer for the All-Star High School game in 1951. In 1952 he appeared on the programme at the National Trainer Convention, a truly great honour in his field.

Ausley is considered tops in his profession — not only by the coaches, players and executive, but by the Bomber Medical Committee as well.

Jim is married and has two daughters. He has taken up residence in Winnipeg and presently is one of the top salesmen in a local retail organization.



Grant, 29 years of age, with a prematurely-grey crew cut, joined the Blue Bombers in 1953 after a two-year stint with Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League. He played his college football, earning all-Conference recognition; at the University of Minnesota.

The new Bombers coach retired from active playing, thus removing one of Canada's most proficient pass-catching ends from the ranks. Grant led all W.I.F.U. pass-catchers in 1953, 1954 and 1956, and achieved all-star status in all three years. In the 1956 season, Bud caught 63 out of 79 passes thrown his way, compiling 970 yards. He was the league's best in all three departments and just missed setting a record for yards gained on passes.

He finished third among the pass-receivers in 1955 and thereby missed the all-star team.

When Grant retired as an active player, he went out in a blaze of glory. He scored two touchdowns for the West in the All-Star Shrine game on December 8, thus becoming the leading scorer in Shrine game history.

Aithough he can point to no previous coaching experience in football, Bud can count on the wholehearted support of the Blue Bomber executive, who chose him over 13 more applicants, all of them loaded with experience. The Bombers point to coaching in baseball and basketball and all-important leadership qualities, which they really admit was No. 1 on their imposing list of requirements.

Bud is married and has four children. He has now taken up permanent residence in Winnipeg.



ROBINSON, WAYNE L.

Assistant Coach

Wayne Robinson played centre and linebacker for the Minnesota Gophers in 1949-50-51, and was captain the last year. He was named the most valuable player in 1950 and he made the All Big Ten and the All Mid-West teams in 1951.

Robinson turned pro in 1952 with the Phildelphia Eagles and played five years with them as line-backer. He made the All Pro team in 1954-55-56 and played in the Pro All-Star game two years. Considered one of the finest linemen ever to play in the National Football League, his past experience together with his insistance on a perfectly conditioned ball club is expected to yield one of the best lines in the league.

Wayne is 27 years old, married and has three children.

GLENN McWHINNEY

Scout

A broken neck suffered in the second game of the semi-final with the Saskatchewan Roughriders in 1956 forced Glenn McWhinney off the football field, but not out of football. After months of recuperation, McWhinney decided he had to get back into football. The way that was least taxing to a man with a broken neck was scouting. The Bombers offered Glenn the job. He took it. He hasn't been sorry. Glenn has been a keen student of football since the days when he played with the Weston Wildcats' juniors and the Norwood-St. Boniface Legionnaires intermediates. He joined the Edmonton Eskimos in 1952 and was a member of the 1954 Grey Cup championship team. He joined the Bombers in 1955. Twenty-seven years old, Glenn today still wears the same poundage as when he was playing. He's 160. Glenn is married and expects an addition to the family this winter.

PLOEN, KENNY

Quarterback

Height 6 feet 2 inches Weight

Weight 180 lbs.

Age 22 State U.

State U. of Iowa

Kenny Ploen's ability as a quarterback is summed up in the statistics compiled during his senor year when he piloted the Iowa Hawkeyes to the Big Ten championship and the Rose Bowl championship. He was the team's leading rusher carrying 78 times for 428 yards and a 5.4 average. He was the team's leading passer completing 24 out of 54 passes for 309 yards. He was the Hawkeyes leading scorer with 32 points. He was also a standout on defense making many key tackles. Ploen operating from the split or wing T can work the option play to perfection as is illustrated by the fact that he led his team in both passing and rushing. His keen sense of balance and speed en-



abled him to break away for many key runs during last season. At the end of the 1956 season Ploen was named the most valuable player in the Big Ten. He was also named to the first string NBC-TV All-American and the second team Associated Press All-American as well as being named to the United Press, International News Service and Associated Press Big Ten Conference All-Star teams. In the Rose Bowl classic in which he led Iowa to a 35-19 victory over Oregon State he scored the first touchdown on a 49 yard run and completed 9 out of 10 passes. He also saved at least one touchdown on a key tackle. Ploen was voted the outstanding player in the game. Ploen is single.



ROSEBOROUGH, BARRY Quarterback Height 6 feet Weight 205 lbs. Age 25 University of North Dakota

Roseborough returned to the Blue Bombers last year after spending three years at University of North Dakota where he was first string quarterback. Barry is a good passer and punter and it is hoped by many that he will develope into a valuable Canadian quarterback. Barry is married.

MENDYK, DENNIS ARTHUR

Height 6 feet

Weight 190 lbs.

Age 22

Halfback Michigan State

Mendyk graduated from Michigan State in 1956 where he was second string halfback till Clarence Peeks was injured, then Dennis took over. He finished up the season as the leading ground gainer for State with a 6.2 yard average per carry. Drafted Number 3 by the World Champion, New York Giants, he played three exhibition games before being their last cut from camp.

Mendyk is rated as a very fast halfback with the ability to go for the big gains. He is also an excellent pass receiver and was used by New York as a flanker.

He is very versatile player who can pass and is able to go both ways equally well as well as having one years experience playing end at Michigan State. Dennis is single.



McNAMARA (BOB) JOHN ROBERT
Height 6 feet Weight 192 lbs. Age 25 University of Minnesota

After being injured in the second game of the 1955 season McNamara returned last year and acquitted himself so well that he convinced many football fans that he was the outstanding halfback in Canada. 1956 statistics tend to back up their convictions as McNamara was the No. 2 point getter in the W.I.F.U. with 102 points, only one behind teammate Buddy Leake. He scored the most touchdowns (17) in the W.I.F.U. He was third in rushing with 1,101 yards on 178 carries and a 6.1 yard average. In kickoff returns he was tops on the Winnipeg Club with 253 yards on 9 returns for 28.1 yard average. He also tied a conference record by scoring six touchdowns in one game

against Vancouver last season. An outstanding power runner Bob has the ability to pick up that key yardage and keep many drives going for tou chdowns. McNamara is expected to be the key man in the Bomber backfield which is rated by experts to be the finest ever assembled in Canada. He is also an outstanding defensive player. Bob is single and runs a bar in Minnesota.

JAMES, GERRY Height 5 feet 11 inches

Weight 187 lbs.

Age 22

Returning to the Blue Bombers after playing hockey for two seasons with the Toronto Maple Leafs, Gerry is expected to be a great asset to the backfield. A hard driving runner, if James returns to his 1955 form when he was runner up to Normie Kwong in total yards gained rushing, he is expected to be once again one of the most valuable players in Canadian football. Gerry was named the outstanding Canadian football player in Canada in 1954. He is the son of former football great Eddie (Dynamiter) James. Gerry is married with two children.





LEAKE, BUDDY
Height 6 feet Weight 185 lbs. Age 25 University of Oklahoma

Buddy Leake came to the Bombers in 1955 as a halfback and reserve quarterback. However, when Freeman failed to show up Buddy found himself as first string quarterback and he led the Bombers to the Western finals that year. Last year Buddy reverted to halfback and ended up by winning the W.I.F.U. scoring championship with 10 touchdowns, three converts and four field goals for 103 points. He also ended up 7th in the league in rushing, carrying 156 times for 633 yards and a four yard average. He was 6th in the league in passing, completed 43 out of 91 passes for 819 yards and a 9 yard average. A keen competitor Leake's ability to pass or run from the half line

keeps the opposition alert and is another key factor in the development of what will probably be the finest backfield ever assembled in Canada. Leake is almost automatic with the converts and the short place kicks. He is also Bombers reserve quarterback. He is married and has three children. LEWIS, (LEO) EVERETT Halfback Height 5 ft. 10 ins. Weight 195 lbs. Age 24 Lincoln College, Missouri

During the 1955 season Leo's ability and speed to run around the end as well as power through tackle made him third in rushing in the W.I.F.U. close behind Kwong and James. An ankle injury however kept him out last season. After allowing him to play basketball during the winter doctors examined his ankle and found it 100 percent fit and have authorized his return to football. If Lewis can return to the form he showed in the 1955 season he will be a great addition to the Bomber backfield. Apart from his ability as a runner he also is an excellent pass receiver and a fair passer. Leo is married and has one son.





ROWLAND, (GORD) GORDON Halfback Height 5 feet 10 inches Weight 170 lbs. Age 26 Montreal Orfuns

Although small, Rowland has proved his value as a defensive halfback for the last three years. His defensive play against the pass and his deadly tackles have saved Bombers on many occasions. He was named to the W.I.F.U. All-Star team for the last two years and played in the East-West Shrine game both years. Rowland's experience could make him the key man in the Bombers defensive backfield. He is also an above average halfback that can be called upon in emergencies. Gord is married.

LATOURELLE, (RON) RONALD GUY


Height 5 feet 8 inches

DAVENPORT (BOB) ROBERT WOODROW Height 6 feet Weight 210 lbs.

Age 24

Fullback U.C.L.A.

Davenport graduated from U.C.L.A. in 1955 where he was rated as the greatest fullback in the history of the College. Bob was on the 1954 Look All-American team and a unanimous choice on the All-Coast team. He was also on the 1955 All-American Board of Football team and on the Associated Press and United Press second team plus the Associated Press All-Pacific team. During the 1956 season he teamed up with McNamara and Leake to give the Bombers one of the outstanding backfields in Canadian football. Davenport a power runner carried the ball 140 times for a net gain of 677 yards and a 4.8 average.

He scored four touchdowns during the season. Bob was handicapped by a trick knee during the entire season, however, an operation last winter proved successful and the doctors have announced that his knee will be 100 percent fit for the coming year. Bob apart from being a outstanding power runner was also the best blocker in the Bomber backfield. He is an above average pass receiver having caught 12 out of 15 passes for 105 yards. With his knee in first class shape again and one years experience under his belt Bob is expected by many to be the outstanding fullback in Canadian football this year. He is married and has one daughter. He is very active in the crusade for Christ movement.

SHEPARD, CHARLEY Fullback Height 6 feet 2 inches Weight 215 lbs. Age 24 North Texas State

Shepard joined the Blue Bombers after Bob Davenport was sidelined for the season. He played last season with Pittsburgh Steelers where he was number two man to the great veteran Fran Rogel. Charley is a very strong runner who is exceptionally hard to stop. He has the ability to carry tacklers with him and is seldom stopped for no gain. Shepard was also a linebacker in college and thus provides the Bomber with additional strength in this vital spot. Shepard is married with one child.



HUTCHINSON, (JACK) JOHN CHARLES Fullback Height 5 feet 11 inches Weight 190 lbs. Age 25 University of B.C.

Jack joined the Blue Bombers last year after two seasons with the B.C. Lions. A very good back Hutchinson is expected to form a large part of the depth so necessary to Canadian teams. A solid hard hitting runner who is developing fast both offensively and defensively. Jack is married and has a daughter.



UECKER, VERNON Guard Height 5 ft. 114 ins. Weight 215 lbs. Age 22 Texas Christian U.

Uecker is a big blond from the German community of New Braunfels in Central Texas. He was starting guard in his three years of college. Vern was rated as the unsung hero of the TCU team who has lots of desire and comes up with at least one big play in every game. A very steady type of player who seldom makes mistakes and carries out assignments well. He moves exceptionally well, is very fast and excells on defence. Uecker was T.C.U.'s top blocker in the middle of the line and along with Baylor's All-American Bill Glass was called the best in the South West Conference on defence in the middle of the line.

MICHELS, JOHN JOSEPH Guard, Linebacker Height 5 feet 11 ins. Weight 215 lbs. Age 25 U. of Tennessee

Michels has one of the most outstanding records of any player to join the Bombers in the last few years. While at the University of Tennessee he captained the team in 1952, played in the Cotton Bowl in 1951 and 1953, in the Sugar Bowl in 1952, in the Hula Bowl in 1953 and on the College All-Star team in 1953. He was named to the All-South Eastern Conference All-Star team in 1951 and 1952 and was named the outstanding blocker in the South Eastern Conference in 1952. The same year he was named to the Associated Press, the United Press, the Chicago Tribune Poll, the Football Writers and the all-American Board All-American teams. This was the year that the



following players all well known in Canada were All-Americans: Bill Vessels, Paul Giel, Bernie Flowers, Tom Stolhanski and Don Moomaw. Michels played guard and centre linebacker for the University of Tennesse the year they were named the best defensvie team in the nation. He is rated tops as a blocking guard. Michels joined the Philadelphia Eagles in 1953 where he alternated as starting guard but after one season was drafted into the Army. 
