## Operational Staff



**RALPH J. SAZIO**  
General Manager

A native of South Orange, N.J., Ralph first joined the Tiger-Cats in 1950, as an import Tackle and Assistant Coach. He was recruited by the then Head Coach and General Manager, Carl Voyles, for whom he had played at the College of William and Mary and the Brooklyn Dodgers in the All American Pro Conference.

Starting his 20th season with the Tiger-Cats, Ralph has held the positions of Player, Assistant Coach, Head Coach, and now General Manager of the Club.

Up to 1963, Ralph turned down several offers of a Head Coaching position to remain in Hamilton and the Tiger-Cats were extremely pleased when Ralph decided to accept the appointment as Head Coach of the Tiger-Cats, in 1963.

As Head Coach of the Tiger-Cats for five years, Ralph compiled an impressive record. The Tiger-Cats, under his guidance were in the playoffs for five consecutive years, and were the Eastern representatives in the National Championship game, the Grey Cup, four times, winning it three times. His overall record was 59 wins, 25 losses, and 1 tied.

When former General Manager, Mr. J. G. Gaudaur was appointed Commissioner of the C.F.L. in 1968, Ralph was named the new General Manager of the Club. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

Apart from football, Ralph is a successful business man in various fields and has been particularly active in community welfare work. The Sazios — his wife Rose and their children, Mark and Peggy, have lived in the Hamilton area since coming here in 1950.



**FRANK M. GIBSON**  
Secretary-Treasurer

A native Hamiltonian, Frank has been associated with Hamilton Football most of his life. In 1949 he joined the Hamilton Tigers in the O.R.F.U. as Treasurer. He was a key person in the formation of the Tiger-Cats in 1950 and since that time has been Secretary-Treasurer and Director of the Club.

Very active in League affairs, he has for many years been Chairman of the Schedule Committee. He was the Eastern Representative on the two-man C.F.L. Committee, with Ralph Parliament, and between them they have developed all of the statistical information which enabled the Interlocking Schedule to come into being. He was President of the E.F.C. in 1963 and is currently the Secretary-Treasurer of the E.F.C.

## Meet the Coaches



JOE RESTIC  
Head Coach

Born in Hastings, Pennsylvania, Joe entered the armed services immediately upon graduation from high school. He volunteered in the U.S. Air Force as an aviation cadet in 1943. He went overseas, in the European Zone, as a 1st Lieutenant. In 1944, Joe was made a Special Agent with the Office of Strategic Services, and was assigned to the Eastern Section of Europe.

After his discharge in 1947, Joe entered Villanova University, where he was an outstanding player. In 1951-52, he made the big jump to the Philadelphia Eagles, as an Offensive End and Defensive Back. During his college days he also played professional baseball with the Philadelphia Phillies.

Joe has continued to work in the field of education, by doing graduate work at Villanova University, Seton Hall College and at Brown University.

He started his coaching career at Brown University in 1956. Joe joined the coaching staff at Colgate University in 1959. In 1961, while he was at Colgate, he came to the Tiger-Cats as Pre-Season Coach.

In 1962, Joe signed as Assistant Coach with the Tiger-Cats, and worked in that position under former Head Coaches, Jim Trimble and Ralph Sazio. As an Assistant Coach, he had many opportunities to become Head Coach, but turned them down in favour of staying with the Tiger-Cats.

In his first year as Head Coach of the Tiger-Cats, Joe has provided for the fans of Hamilton an interesting and entertaining team. He will fit the pieces together and put the Tiger-Cats back in first place.

The Restics — Joe and Bea — have three children, Cathy, Joe and Susan.



**AL BRUNO**  
Assistant Coach

Al is from West Chester, Pa., and attended Kentucky University, where he was an All-American player. Although he was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles, he joined the Toronto Argonauts in 1952, where he played until 1954, and was an outstanding End in Canadian Football. Played in 1955 and '56 with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

In 1957 he coached at De La Salle College in Toronto, and taught there as well. He was instrumental in forming the Junior team, North York Knights, in Toronto.

Al continued his coaching career as Head Coach of the London Lords, in 1958, and in 1960 his team won the O.R.F.U. Championship.

In 1961 he returned to his home town of West Chester, Pennsylvania, and followed his coaching career when he was appointed the Head Coach of the local high school.

In 1966 and '67 he was Assistant Coach with the Ottawa Rough Riders. He joined the Tiger-Cats as an Assistant Coach in 1968.

Al is married and has three children.



For the past eight years Carl has been the Head Defensive and Line Coach at the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland. His college coaching experience also took him to Colgate and Marquette Universities, his alma mater.

Carl spent four years in the Marine Corps during World War II.

After graduating from Marquette University, he played with the Buffalo Bills in the All American Conference as a Linebacker and when Buffalo discontinued having professional football, he was drafted by the Green Bay Packers and played there for two years as a Centre.

Carl is not a complete stranger to Canadian Football, having spent two years with the Saskatchewan Roughriders in 1958 and '59.

Carl is married and has two children. He will be making his home in Hamilton.

## Playing Personnel

### Quarterbacks

**JOE ZUGER**, import, 6'2", 215 lbs., 28 years of age. Joe joined the Tiger-Cats in 1962, after leading all U.S. college players in both running and pass interceptions, and was regarded as the finest quarterback in Arizona State's history. With Hamilton, Joe was used as defensive halfback until the injury to Faloney in 1962, and then he and Cosentino shared the signal-calling job. Against the Saskatchewan Roughriders, he virtually rewrote the record book, establishing a new mark (eight) in touchdown passes and total yardage passing. He was the team's No. 1 quarterback in 1965, and also was the top punter in the C.F.L., with an average of 44.7 yards. In 1967 he was selected the Outstanding Player in the Grey Cup game. In 1968 he was the leading punter in the C.F.L. with an outstanding average of 48.4.

**JOHN ECKMAN**, import, 6'1", 195 lbs., 22 years of age. A native of Manasquan, N.J. In 1966, with Wichita State University, he led the nation in passing, was honourable mention All-American, first team All Conference and Co-Captain of the Wichita Club. He threw for 205 completions of 413 attempts for 2,773 yards and 11 touchdowns. In 1967 there was a coaching change at Wichita and the new coach stressed more of a running game, but even so, Eckman again was Captain of the football team, made the All-Conference selection and completed 54 passes out of 115 attempts for 997 yards and 8 touchdowns. In 1968 he went to the Atlanta Falcons of the N.F.L. and when he was released he joined the Lowell Giants, a team in the Continental Football League, with whom he completed the year.

**JOHN MANEL**, non-import, 6'2", 215 lbs., 22 years of age. John is a local boy, graduating from Cathedral High School. He attended Kansas State in 1966 and '67 and then left for personal reasons. John had a brief tryout with the Tiger-Cats in 1968.

### Centres

**JOHN MICHALUK**, 6'1", 225 lbs., 24 years of age. A Hamilton native, John attended Kent State University, where he had an outstanding college career. Upon graduation in 1965 he joined the Tiger-Cats and saw action both offensively at centre, and defensively as a linebacker. Will be competing for one of the starting positions.

**JOHN REID**, non-import, 6'4", 255 lbs., 24 years of age. John is another product from the Tiger-Cat Rookie Camp. He received a scholarship to Tulsa University, where he played under Glenn Dobbs, a former Canadian star with the Regina Rough Riders. He is making a strong bid for the offensive centre position this year.

## Ends (Offensive)

**GORD CHRISTIAN**, non-import, 6'4", 210 lbs., 22 years of age. Gord attended high school in Hamilton and in 1966 played with the Hamilton Hurricanes Junior Team in Hamilton. In 1967, his first year of professional football, his aggressiveness enabled him to score a touchdown in his first pro game against the Edmonton Eskimos when he recovered a fumble in the end zone. His vicious downfield tackling on punt returns has made him known throughout Canada. Has an excellent pair of hands, and the coaches hope that he will hold down the offensive end position this year. In 1968 he showed his versatility by playing both defensively and offensively in several positions. This year he will be used strictly as a Flanker.

**TOMMY JOE COFFEY**, non-import, 6', 195 lbs., 31 years of age. He was a Conference All-Star at West Texas State, and upon graduation in 1959 was the 8th draft choice of the Baltimore Colts. One of the top offensive ends to ever play in Canada, he has caught a total of 431 passes, and gained 6,877 yards and has scored a total of 475 points. His total yardage of 6,877 yards makes him second to another former Tiger-Cat star, Hal Patterson, in number of yards gained in Canadian Pro Football. His 81 receptions in 1964 and 1965 were Western Conference records. In 1967 he was the leading scorer in Canada, with 107 points. He is the all-time leading pass receiver in the number of receptions. In 1968 he was named to the All-Canadian team for the fifth straight year.

**DAVE VITI**, import, 6'2", 235 lbs., 28 years of age. Dave was a prize Cat catch in 1962. He was a high draft choice of Washington, in the N.F.L., and Buffalo, in the A.F.L., after two great performances in post-season Bowl games with the University of Boston, but decided to play in Canada. In 1963 he was the team's third best receiver, catching 27 passes, for a total of 361 yards. In 1964 he was switched to defensive end and has developed into one of the outstanding players at this position in the League. In 1968 Dave showed his versatility by starting the season as a Defensive End and ending up on offense.

## *Ends (Defensive)*

**BILLY JAMES DOSS**, import, 6'2", 240 lbs., 24 years of age. Billy is not a stranger to Canadian football having joined the Montreal Alouettes in 1966 after being released by the Atlanta Falcons. He spent two years with the Montreal Club and in 1968 the Toronto Argonauts signed him and because of the makeup of their squad, released Doss early in the year. He is very versatile and has always impressed the Tiger-Cat Coaching Staff with his ability, especially when he played with the Montreal Alouettes.

**TOM KRAWCZYK**, non-import, 6'1", 225 lbs., 22 years of age. Tom was a second draft choice of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats this year and is a graduate of McMaster University. He was Co-Captain of the McMaster team and received All-Star rating.

**LONNIE MAICH**, non-import, 6'2", 240 lbs., 25 years of age. Lonnie is from Brantford, Ont., where he played high school football. On graduating from high school he attended the Tiger-Cat Rookie Camp, from which he was able to attract the coaches from Kent State, who offered him a football scholarship. Although he was eligible to play in 1967, he returned to school to complete his education. Used primarily on defense in 1968, he showed willingness to play.

**STEVE WITKOWSKI**, import, 6'1½", 235 lbs., 24 years of age. Attended Central Missouri State College during which he made the All Conference Team for three straight years and in his senior year Honourable Mention, Little All-American. In 1968 he tried out with the Ottawa Club and was released prior to the start of the season.

## *Linebackers*

**BOB KROUSE**, non-import, 6'1", 190 lbs., 25 years of age. Bob came into the Tiger-Cat camp direct from Central Collegiate in Hamilton, where he had won several athletic awards and had been named to the Spectator High School All-Star team for the three years. In 1967, his first year as a regular with the Club, Bob was named on the defensive team of the Eastern Conference All-Star Selection as linebacker.

**ROY DAVIS**, import, 6'2", 220 lbs., 23 years of age. Attended Prairie View College. On graduating he joined the Kansas City Chiefs as a free agent. The Tiger-Cats brought him up halfway through the 1968 season and he was tried as an inside and outside Linebacker. Played against the Toronto Argonauts on September 8th last year when the Tiger-Cats defeated Toronto 20-6 in one of their better games of the '68 season. Will be used as a middle linebacker.

**HENRY SORRELL**, import, 6'2", 230 lbs., 25 years of age. Henry attended the University of Chatanooga where he was selected Little All American in 1965 and '66. In 1967 and 1968 he was with the Denver Broncos and Cincinnati Bengals. This year the Hamilton Club traded Montreal Alouettes for his services.

## *Tackles*

**ELLISON KELLY**, non-import, 6'3", 255 lbs., 31 years of age. He joined the Tiger-Cats halfway through the 1960 season after a year with the New York Giants as an offensive guard, and in 1964 he was named to both the Big Four and All-Canadian All-Star teams at this position. He was shifted to offensive tackle in 1965, and has played very effectively at this position since that time. Is at present Co-Captain of the team.

**DOUG MITCHELL**, non-import, 6'2", 240 lbs., 24 years of age. Doug graduated from the University of Western Ontario, where in his final year he was named Western's Athlete of the Year for his accomplishments in football and in wrestling. In 1966 he won the Canadian Inter-Collegiate Heavyweight Wrestling Championship. Capable of playing both ways as a Defensive End as well as Centre, and with a definite potential to become an accomplished place kicker. Capable of playing both ways, but being used this year strictly as an Offensive Tackle.

**ANGELO MOSCA**, non-import, 6'4", 275 lbs., 32 years of age. Ange came into Canadian football from Notre Dame, broke in with Hamilton and then, in trades, played with Montreal and Ottawa, before returning to the Tiger-Cats in 1962. His bone-crunching line play was one of the key factors in Hamilton's great 1963 Grey Cup win. In recognition of his all-round performance playing offensively and defensively, he was named the Top Lineman in the Big Four in 1963, and was a nominee for the Schenley Award as Top C.F.L. Lineman of the Year. He was named to the 1965 and 1966 Big Four All Star teams. During the off-season he is wrestling on the local circuit.

**BOB STEINER**, non-import, 6'4", 240 lbs., 23 years of age. Bob came directly out of Hamilton school system to the Tiger-Cats, playing part of the 1965 season with the Hamilton Hurricanes. Big, young and aggressive, he is considered to have a definite future in Pro Football.

## Guards

**JOHN BARROW**, non-import, 6'2", 248 lbs., 32 years of age. John graduated from the University of Florida in 1957, where he won many All-American honours. He signed with the Tiger-Cats, although drafted by the Detroit Lions. He has been a perennial All-Canadian All-Star selection since joining the team, and was the Eastern nominee for the Schenley "Pro Lineman of the Year Award" in 1962, 1964, 1965 and 1967, and won the "Outstanding Lineman of the Year Award" in 1962. He has been considered the heart of the famous Hamilton defense, and Captain of the team. Because of an injury suffered early in the 1968 season which hampered his play, John missed making the C.F.L. All-Star team for the first time since coming to Canada.

**BILL DANYCHUK**, non-import, 6'3", 240 lbs., 25 years of age. Bill graduated from the Niagara District Secondary School at Niagara-on-the-Lake in 1960, and has played with Tennessee University since then. He was the team's leading scorer in basketball all through Junior and Senior High School. In his first year, Bill played first string offensive tackle and guard all the way, and last year was the team's No. 1 offensive guard. In 1968 he was named to the C.F.L. All-Star team.

**JON HOHMAN**, import, 6'1", 245 lbs., 24 years of age. Jon was an outstanding player at the University of Wisconsin, and was a high draft choice of the Denver Broncos, where he played regularly during the 1966 season. On a tip from Coach Malavasi, who had been his Head Coach, the Tiger-Cats were able to acquire Jon from the Broncos in 1967. He could develop into one of the outstanding linemen in Canadian Football.

## Backs

**WILLIE BETHEA**, import, 6', 198 lbs., 29 years of age. Bethea, primarily a quick-hitting back, played with the Patterson, N.J. Miners in 1962, and was the league-leading rusher and scorer in the Atlantic Coast Conference. He has the ability to run both inside and out, and is a better-than-average pass receiver. In 1965 he gained 611 yards rushing, scoring five touchdowns, and in 1966 he gained 521 yards, and scored two touchdowns. In 1967 Willie was moved to a fullback position and was the leading rusher of the Hamilton Club, with 147 carries for 737 yards. He was second to Tommy Joe Coffey in pass receptions, with a total of 520 yards. His outstanding performance was realized when he was selected on the Eastern Conference All-Star team. He led the team in rushing in 1968.

**ED BUCHANAN**, import, 6'1", 190 lbs., 29 years of age. Came up to Canada and joined the Calgary Stampeders in 1961 after a successful college career at San Diego Junior College. Ed really came into his own when he joined the Regina Roughriders in 1963. In the year 1964 he was one of the outstanding performers in Canadian Football, being second in the Country for total yards gained, with a record of 1,390 yards. He also was on the receiving end of 36 passes of 38 thrown to him, for additional yardage of 681 yards. For his performance that year he was selected on the All-Canadian Team. Traded to the Toronto Argonauts in 1968, Ed was not able to break into the Dillard-Symons backfield and with a year of rest, the Tiger-Cats feel that Buchanan can once again be an outstanding performer in Canadian Football.

**DAVE FLEMING**, 6', 205 lbs., 23 years of age. Dave went straight from high school and sandlot football to the camp of the Pittsburgh Steelers. He was their last release in 1965, and joined the Tiger-Cats for three games. He has outstanding speed, and is a good receiver and needs only experience to develop into a topflight Pro. He played defence for the first time in 1966, and played regularly at defensive halfback, intercepting three passes. In 1967 he was used both offensively and defensively during the year, played offense all of 1968 and led the team in total yardage.

**BARRIE HANSEN**, non-import, 5'10", 180 lbs., 27 years of age. He joined the Alouettes upon graduation from the San Fernando Valley State College, and played there for two years. He went to Winnipeg in a trade and was a regular defensive halfback for the Winnipeg team for the past three years. **GARNEY HENLEY**, import, 6', 180 lbs., 30 years of age. Garney enjoyed what could only be termed a "spectacular" 1962 season, climaxed by an unforgettable performance in the Grey Cup Game against the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. He joined Hamilton after being released by the Green Bay Packers in late 1960, had an impressive rookie season and then went on to be one of the most-talked-about performers in Canada. He has great native speed, a bewildering change of pace, and is a certain-as-death receiver. For his play in 1963, he won the Jeff Russell Award as the League's Most Valuable Player. In 1965 he intercepted five passes and led the League in punt returns, with 557 yards. He was selected the Eastern nominee for the Schenley Outstanding Player Award in 1965. In 1968, another outstanding year for Garney, during which he was selected on the All-Canadian team.

**FRANK LORIA**, import, 5'10", 185 lbs., 22 years of age. Defensive Back. Graduate of Virginia Tech Institute where he was an All-American Consensus in 1966 and 1967. Probably the most known player to come to the Hamilton Club as far as All-American rating is concerned since John Barrow. An outstanding punt return man and in his senior year returned one punt for 95 yards and a touchdown. Led the team in interceptions and in 1966 returned three punts for touchdowns.

**TED PAGE**, non-import, 5'10", 185 lbs., 26 years of age. On graduation from the Los Angeles State College, he joined the Montreal Alouettes in 1962. In 1963 and 1964 he led the League in punt returns and the Tiger-Cats acquired him by trade in 1965. As a defensive halfback in 1965 he intercepted four passes and has been a regular defensive halfback or corner linebackers for the past three years.

**ED TUREK**, non-import, 5'11", 195 lbs., 23 years of age. Ed graduated from Central High School in Hamilton, and after attending the University of Buffalo for one year, he transferred to Waterloo Lutheran University and from 1963 through 1965 he was one of the outstanding College players in Canada. He was the No. 1 draft choice of the Edmonton Eskimos in 1966, and the Tiger-Cats acquired him that year in a trade from Edmonton. He has been clocked in track competition at 9.8 for the 100 yards.

**DICK WESOŁOWSKI**, non-import, 6'1", 210 lbs., 22 years of age. A local boy and a graduate of Cathedral High School. Attended the University of North Carolina on a scholarship where he played regular for three years as an Offensive Back. In his senior year he averaged 4.1 yards per carry. Dick has a great future in Canadian Football.

**CHARLIE BROWN**, import, 6'1", 195 lbs., 26 years of age. A graduate of Syracuse University in 1966 and was the second draft choice of the Chicago Bears in that year. Was with the Bears for two seasons and then traded to Buffalo. Will be used this year as a Defensive Back. Well known for his kick-off returns.
