PRESIDENT

COACHING STAFF



Otis W. Douglas Jr.
HEAD COACH

Otis was born in Roadville, Virginia, one of a family of ten. He graduated in Physical Education from the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia, and played guard and tackle in his college football days.

After receiving a Doctorate in Education and Masters in Arts, he was assistant coach at his Alma Mater for seven years. From there he went to the University of Akron, serving as Athletic Director until 1942.

For the next three years, Otis was in the Navy where he coached with Jim Tatum and played at Jacksonville Naval Air Station. He played three years with the Philadelphia Eagles who won the World Championship in 1948-49. From here, his coaching duties took him to Drexel Tech., University of Arkansas (in the tough South-West Conference), Baltimore Colts and the Chicago Cardinals where he was defensive coach and then to Villanova University. He left Villanova during the 1956 season to accept the Head Coaching job with the Stampeders.

Coach Douglas is married and has two children, Eleanor, 14, and Otis, Jr. 19 years of age. Their home is in Hague, Virginia, where such businesses as Pheasant and Oyster farming and running a resort keep him busy in the off-season. A great asset to these careers is his flying ability as he has been an aviator for ten years.



Bernie Witucki
LINE COACH

Bernie was born in South Bend, Indiana. He attended Notre Dame University for two years, then transferred to George Washington University, where he graduated in 1935.

He coached at Washington High School in South Bend for eight years and during that time the school won the State Championship three times, 1937, 1939 and 1941. Bernie then enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1943, and was physical instructor for three years. Upon discharge, he became assistant coach of the now defunct Chicago Rockets in the All America Conference. His coaching duties continued at Tulsa University, and he remained with them for four years and during that time developed such outstanding linemen as Kay Vaughn, Ottawa Rough-

ider and Schenley Award Winner, and All-American Marvin Matuszak, who is currently with the Baltimore Colts. Bernie was Head Coach at Tulsa in 1953 and 1954, and then joined Notre Dame University's coaching staff in 1955. He left Notre Dame in the spring of 1959 to accept the position of line coach with the Stampeders.

He is 48 years old, is married and has three children.

Tom Keane

BACKFIELD COACH

Tom Keane, ex-National League player and coach will commence his first year in coaching Canadian football with the Stampeders in 1960, acting as backfield coach. Keane, a ten-year veteran in the N.F.L. split his duties between the Chicago Cardinals and Baltimore Colts, L.A. Rams as a player and also as an assistant coach with the Cardinals in 1957. For the past two years he has acted as high school coach in Bellaire, Ohio, and a graduate of the University of Western Virginia. He is married and has three children, two boys and a girl.

ASSISTANT COACH AND
CHIEF SCOUT

Rogers joined the Tulsa University staff in 1953 and has been the line coach there for the past seven years. He is 32 years old and is a graduate of Tulsa University, where he lettered in football the seasons of '46 to '49. He was captain of the 1949 Tulsa team. Rogers coached high school football at Tulsa's Casola Hall and then went into the Airforce where he played for two years on the National Service championship team at Carswell Airforce Base. Rogers is married, the father of three children, two boys and a girl. Mr. Lehew plans to reside in the city of Calgary permanently.

TRAINER

Larry came to the Stampeders in 1959, very highly recommended. He worked with Head Trainer John Rockwell (now with the Cardinals in the N.F.L.) at the University of Colorado for five years—four years as a student trainer, and one year as a full time assistant trainer. Larry lettered three years in track, and was also assistant track coach at Colorado. He served as head trainer at Colorado during the 1958 spring football season during the absence of John Rockwell. After the 1959 season with the Stampeders, Larry returned to the U. of Colorado to complete his Master's Degree. Larry is from Atkinson, Nebraska, where his parents ranch. He is married, and he and his wife Gaynor, plan to make Calgary their home.

STAMPEDERS 1960



The Calgary Stampeders Football Club has finally come up with a quarterback who should certainly solve their problems for many years to come. Joe Kapp, outstanding rookie of the 1959 season and the League's leading passer in the Western Conference, should develop into one of the "super stars" of the Canadian Football League in the future. It seems that Calgary's main trouble experienced up to 1959, was the lack of a capable field general. Many outstanding boys were tried, but most of these were over the hill when they arrived in Calgary. Such former greats as Frankie Albert from the 49ers, Eddie LeBaron of the Washington Redskins, and Don Kloeterman of the Cleveland Browns, all tried unsuccessfully to make a winner out of the Stampeders. Kapp's arrival on the scene has done wonders for the football club here in Calgary, and it is expected that Joe will lead the Stampeders out of the woods.

The Stampeders also have strengthened in many other departments, and with the exception of the quarterback position, the most noticeable strength would lie in our Canadian talent. Previous to this season, it has been a catch-as-catch-can operation for securing Canadians, but this year the Stampeders will go into camp with no less than 33 Canadian football players, of which 19 have had previous professional experience. Through trades and picking boys up on waivers, the Stampeders have come up with a nucleus of fine Canadian talent, and are recognized as one of the teams in the West with the best Canadians.

Although the Stampeders will start this season with basically the same team they finished with last year, there have been several new additions which certainly should strengthen the team to date. Along the import line, such additions as Lovell Coleman, Western Michigan, will strengthen the import roster. In a recent trade with the Toronto Argos, the Stamps picked up Clare Exelby, Jerry Doucette, Morgan Clark, all proven Canadian football players, and in a trade with the B.C. Lions early this year, the Stamps acquired Chuck Quilter, a seasoned tackle who knows his way around the Western Conference. All of these boys are expected to make strong bids for berths on the 1960 Stampeders team.

The Stampeders hope to be starting the League schedule in their brand new "McMahon" Stadium, with a seating capacity of 20,000. This in itself will be a great boost to the fans in Southern Alberta, and especially to the football team, who in the past several years have been playing in what has been referred to as "the worst stadium on the North American continent." However, with the McMahon's donation of \$300,000 to get this new stadium started, it is agreed by everyone concerned that it will be a first class stadium and should do wonders for the team morale.

The head coach of the Stampeders, Otis Douglas, will be starting his fourth full year as head man for the Stamps, and certainly if there were any doubts about Otis knowing

the Canadian game in the past, that should be rectified now, as he is the oldest coach in the Western Conference in point of service. Incidentally, he is also the oldest in age, as Otis will be 49 years old this July. Assisting Otis will be Bernie Witucki, ex-Notre Dame line coach, who will be starting his second year in charge of the Stampeders line. The backfield coach is Tom Keane, ex-National Football League great who spent ten years playing defense in the National League, and he should be a fine addition to the Stampeders organization.

The Stampeders realize that to be competitive in the Canadian Football League for years to come, they must do a better job of developing and producing football material from their own area. Consequently, Mr. Rogers Lebew, line coach at Tulsa University for the past seven years, was hired in February of 1960 to fill the dual position in chief talent scout and developer of all minor football for the Stampeders. More emphasis will be placed on homebrew talent, and under Mr. Lebew's capable direction, it certainly should pay dividends. To date, Mr. Lebew has talked with every high school in Southern Alberta, those schools that are currently playing football, and those that desire to ultimately have football in their program, and this season will find four new high schools in Southern Alberta putting football in their athletic program. This has to pay dividends for the future.

There is a great deal of optimism here in the Stampede City about this coming football season, and everyone is keeping their fingers crossed and hoping that this will be the year for the Stampeders. Our prediction for 1960 is that the Stampeders will have the best football club that have had since 1949, when they were in the Grey Cup finals. Whether they finish on top in 1960 remains to be seen, but certainly there has been a marked improvement in the organization in the past three years, and everyone concerned feels that this will be our year.

BILL YANCHUK

EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Bill, an ex-Winnipegger, joined the Stampeders in 1959 as equipment manager. Although he is primarily a hockey player, he did play some football during high school in Winnipeg. He takes a great interest in all sports, and is an all round athlete. Ever since his teens, he has been approached by hockey scouts, although he never turned professional. Bill has played hockey in the American League and various leagues throughout Canada and the United States and claims he has retired, at least until next season. WILLIAM BARBER, 6' 3", 204 lbs., 24 years. First year with the Stampedeers. Hometown, Miami, Florida. William is a graduate of Florida A. and M. University where he lettered as a freshman and a sophomore and was named to the All-Conference team and also All-City and All-State teams. He spent the years 1957 and 1958 in the U.S. Army. He is single and an American citizen.

MORGAN CLARK, 6' 2 1/2 lbs., 24 years. First year with the Stampedeers. Hometown, Toronto, Ontario. Morgan is a graduate of Western University where he played with the University Mustangs and was named to the Inter-Collegiate All-Star team in 1957. In 1958 he was with the Sarnia Golden Bears of the O.R.F.U. and was purchased from them by the B.C. Lions. Late in the 1959 season he went to Toronto and was obtained by the Stampedeers early in 1960 in a trade. He is single and a Canadian citizen.

BILL MCKENNA, 6' 3", 215 lbs., 26 years. Third year with the Stampedeers. Hometown, Salem, Mass. Attended Brandeis University and was selected as the most outstanding student and athlete at the university in 1954. He was selected on a number of all-star teams in the East and was one of the leading pass catchers of the nation in 1954. In 1955 with the Stampedeers, he caught 34 out of 40 attempts for an 85% completion, gained 863 yards for 19.5 average and 5 T.D.'s. Bill makes Calgary his home. He is single and a American citizen.

ART SCULLION, 6' 2 1/2", 215 lbs., 29 years. Fourth year with the Stampedeers. Hometown, Toronto, Ontario. Art was a member of the Toronto Argonauts in 1951 to 1954, the Hamilton Tiger Cats in 1955 and the Toronto Beavers in 1956. Chosen on the 1958 East West Shrine team and elected to the 1958 W.I.F.U. ERNIE WARLICK, 6' 4", 230 lbs., 28 years. Fourth year with the Stampedeers. Hometown, Hickory, North Carolina. Ernie attended North Carolina College and was named on C.I.A.A. All-Conference and Negro All-American teams for three seasons. Played four years Service Ball at Bolling Airforce Base. Chosen on the 1958 East-West Shrine team and elected to the 1958 W.I.F.U. offensive all-star team. He is married and an American citizen.

TACKLES

OPIE BANDY, 6' 2", 232 lbs., 23 years. Second year with the Stampedeers. Hometown, Kingfisher, Oklahoma. Opie is a graduate of the University of Tulsa, where he made All-Missouri Valley Conference two years in a row. Voted as the outstanding lineman for three consecutive years in the Missouri Valley Conference. Unanimous selection for All-Conference honors in 1958 and received honorable mention All-America on many teams in the States. Bandy played in the Senior Bowl game in 1958 and drew national acclaim for his performance. Used at the middle guard position in 1959, Bandy rated right behind Patrick at Winnipeg for league honors. He is single and an American citizen.

DOUG BROWN, 6' 1/2", 230 lbs., 25 years. Third year with the Stampedeers. Hometown, Victoria, B.C. Six years intermediate ball and five years with the Royal Canadian Navy. One year with the Oak Bay Drakes. In 1958 Doug placed third in scoring in the W.I.F.U. with a total of 83 points. In 1959 he led the W.I.F.U. with the most field goals attempted (25) and completed 14. He also had the best convert percentage for 1959 in the W.I.F.U. He is married and a Canadian citizen.

GEORGE HANSEN, 6' 2", 215 lbs., 23 years. Second year with the Stampedeers. Hometown, Calgary, Alberta. Attended University of Georgia, where he lettered two years for Coach Wally Butts at offensive guard and tackle. He is married and a Canadian citizen.

DON LUZZI, 6', 230 lbs., 24 years. Third year with the Stampeders. Hometown, North Branford, Connecticut. Graduate of Villanova University, where he was co-captain of the 1957 squad. In 1956 and 1957 he was named to the Catholic College All-America team and also in 1957 he was named on several All-American teams. Played for the North Squad in the 1958 Senior Bowl game in Mobile, Alabama. Chosen on the East-West Shrine team in 1958.
