DR. WES MUNSIE

President

Dr. Wesley P. (Wes) Munsie became president of the B.C. Lions in 1971 after an association with the football club which began with the team's inception.

Dr. Munsie is Winnipeg-born and educated at the University of Manitoba, the University of B.C. and the University of Oregon. Dr. Munsie has been a member of the Lions' board for five years — and

is past president of the Canadian Dental Association.

Dr. Munsie was present, back in 1952, at a Vancouver newspaper office, when a number of prominent citizens met to discuss the possibility of starting a professional football franchise in Vancouver. He has closely followed the progress of the team, as a fan, a director, and now as team president.

Dr. Munsie became vice-president of the Western Football Conference this past winter.

JACKIE PARKER

General Manager



Excitement has always been a part of the life of Jack Dickerson Parker. He was one of the greatest players ever in the Canadian Football League. He's been a head coach and an assistant coach. Now he's the general manager of the B.C. Lions, a team he's determined to make exciting — and successful — on the field.

Mr. Parker took over his present position in 1971. He first joined the Lions in 1968 as an assistant, was named head coach during the 1969 season, and remained head coach until his appointment to the position of general manager.

After scoring 120 points (still the all-time record in the Southeastern Conference) for Mississippi State in 1953, Jack headed north, to Edmonton, where in 1954 the Eskimos won the Grey Cup when he returned a fumble 90 some yards late in the game. Edmonton won three straight Canadian Football League championships, and the name Parker was synonymous with winning. Three times he was named the most outstanding player in the CFL; seven times he was the most outstanding player in the Western Football Conference.

He was traded to Toronto late in 1962 and finished his career with the Argonauts in 1966. His career point total: 750 points.

In 1971, Mr. Parker was named to the Canadian Football League's Hall of Fame, as a player.

Jack, now 41, his wife, Peggy, and their three children live in West Vancouver.

EAGLE KEYS

Head Coach



Now in his 24th year in Canadian Football, Eagle Keys is in his second season as head coach of the B.C. Lions.

The 49-year-old native of Turkey Neck Bend, Ky., was an outstanding centre in the CFL, playing with Montreal and Edmonton. Following the Eskimos' 1954 Grey Cup win, he retired as a player and moved into the coach ranks. He took over as head coach of the Esks in 1959, and one year later had them in the Grey Cup.

Mr. Keys left Edmonton following the 1963 season and moved to Saskatchewan, where he was an assistant coach until 1965, when he took over as head coach. The Roughriders were in the Grey Cup in 1966 at Empire Stadium — and won it, beating the Ottawa Rough Riders. Saskatchewan was in the Grey Cup in 1967 and 1969, too, but was unable to duplicate its earlier success.

Following the 1970 season, Mr. Keys moved west, taking over as head coach of the Lions.

Mr. Keys and his coaching staff spend many hours watching films. Their day often begins at 6 a.m. and ends late at night. This type of dedicated work perhaps is why three of Mr. Keys' former assistants — Jim Spavital (Winnipeg), Jim Duncan (Calgary) and Jack Gotta (Ottawa) — are now head coaches in the CFL.

Mr. Keys, a graduate of Western Kentucky State College, his wife, Joyce, and their five children reside in Burnaby.

BOB ACKLES

Assistant to the General Manager



No one directly connected with the B.C. Lions has a closer association with the team since its inception than Bob Ackles. He's been with the team since its first season in 1954.

Mr. Ackles began as the Lions' water boy, then became involved in the thankless task of managing equipment. Five years ago he assumed the responsibilities of minor football co-ordinator, and

in this, his 20th season with the club, is the assistant to the general manager, Jack Parker.

Mr. Ackles has a sound working knowledge of all phases of the game, right from equipment, to player personnel, to training camp procedures, to travel arrangements.

Bob, his wife, Kay, and their two sons, Steve and Scott, live in Vancouver.

KEN McCULLOUGH

Assistant Coach

Now in his fifth season as an assistant coach under Eagle Keys, Ken McCullough came west with Mr. Keys for the 1971 season with the B.C. Lions.

Mr. McCullough, 39, is a native of Martlesville, Okla., and played with Oklahoma State as an offensive end for four seasons. In 1955, he joined Edmonton Eskimos for one season, before entering the U.S. military service.

He coached college football at West Texas State for four seasons before joining Mr. Keys in 1969.

Mr. McCullough coaches the offensive line with the Lions.

Ken and his wife, Joanne, have four children. They live in Langley.



OWEN DEJANOVICH

Assistant Coach

In his third season with the B.C. Lions, Owen Dejanovich came to the Lions from the University of Tulsa, where he coached the defensive line. He also handles the defensive line with the Lions.

A native of Chicago, Mr. Dejanovich was a Marine all-star as a defensive end with the U.S. Marine Corp in 1957-1958.

He later received All-American honors as a collegiate player at Thornton Community College and Arizona State College.

Mr. Dejanovich played in the American Football League for the Houston Oilers, had a brief tryout with Saskatchewan Roughriders (head coach, Eagle Keys) in 1965, then began his coaching career that season at Northern Arizona. He moved to Tulsa in 1969.

Owen and his wife, Lesley, have three children. They also live in Langley.

BUD TYNES

Assistant Coach

John (Bud) Tynes, who came to B.C. from the University of Iowa, is in his third season with the B.C. Lions, coaching the defensive backs.

A native of Brookhaven, Miss., he graduated from the University of Utah in 1963 and received his Master's Degree in Physical Education the following year.

A running back and a defensive back, Mr. Tynes began his coaching career at Utah in 1963. He moved over to Iowa in 1966. Mr. Tynes, 32, was defensive co-ordinator at Iowa in 1968 when the Hawkeyes led the Big Ten in total defence.

Bud and his wife, Lyn, have two children.



ROY CAVALLIN

Head Trainer

Roy Cavallin is now in his 15th season as head trainer of the B.C. Lions. The Cavallin name is famous in B.C. sports history, as Roy was an outstanding lacrosse and soccer player before he became a trainer.

"Rocky" Cavallin's reputation as a trainer is highly regarded by all professional sports organizations in this province. He's a former president of the B.C. Athletic Trainers' Association.

Mr. Cavallin, his wife, Isabelle, and family reside in Burnaby.

CREIGHTON O'MALLEY

Assistant Trainer

A native of Winnipeg, Creighton O'Malley has lived on the West Coast for more than 30 years.

After working with many amateur sports organizations, Mr. O'Malley joined the B.C. Lions' staff in 1967, working with Roy Cavallin.

Mr O'Malley, his wife, Joan, and their two children live in Burnaby.

DARRYL LOVELY

Equipment Manager

A former physical education and recreation instructor at the Canadian Forces base in Chilliwack, Darryl Lovely is now in his second season as equipment manager of the Lions.

A New Brunswick native, Mr. Lovely was associated with numerous sports during his 23 years in the military service.

Mr. Lovely, his wife, Sonya, and their four children live near Chilliwack.

WILLIAM LOWTHER

Business Manager

William Lowther has been a member of the B.C. Lions administrative team since 1958. A former banker, Mr. Lowther is responsible for office management procedures and co-ordinating ticket control at agencies, the downtown office and the stadium.

Mr. Lowther and his family live in Vancouver.

GRANT KERR

Public Relations

Grant Kerr is the newest member of the front office team, taking over in the areas of public relations, promotions, publications, marketing and advertising.

Mr. Kerr has a complete media background, with considerable experience in television, radio, newspaper and the publishing business.

THE GREY CUP YEARS

1963

The year 1963 marked the first season in the history of the Lions that the club had reached the Grey Cup for the national championship.

Right from the start of the season, the Lions were talking Grey Cup and head coach Dave Skrien encouraged it. The national final was to be played in Vancouver and the players felt they could make it. They rolled up a 12-4 record during the regular season. It was a season that saw seven Lions selected to the All-Canadian team. They included quarterback Joe Kapp, half-back Willie Fleming, offensive guard Tom Hinton, offensive tackle Lonnie Dennis, defensive end Dick Fout, middle linebacker Tom Brown and corner linebacker Norm Fieldgate. Brown was selected as the nation's top lineman and quarterback Joe Kapp was runner-up for Player-of-the-Year.

Neal Beaumont also made history that year when he intercepted a pass in the end zone and ran it back 120 yards — a CFL record. Attendance averaged 31,638 per game. Lions eliminated Saskatchewan two games to one in the Western Conference finals, but they were tired and bruised when it came time for the Grey Cup game against Hamilton. Two top receivers — Pat Claridge and Sonny Homer — were hurt when the game started and Willie Fleming and Ron Morris were forced out with injuries. The Lions lost 21 - 10 to a better team, but had gained some valuable experience for the year ahead.

1964

When training camp opened in 1964, the Lions hadn't forgotten about their tough 21 - 10 loss to the Hamilton Tiger-Cats the year before at Empire Stadium.

Coach Dave Skrien took a look at the schedule and forecast it would take 11 victories to win the Western Conference championship. The Lions won 11, tied three and lost two in a victorious title battle with Calgary.

It hadn't been easy. Fullback Nub Beamer had retired from last year's team but his place was taken by Bob Swift, a 20-year-old rookie. The defensive team — which had been nicknamed "The Headhunters" — was led by Tom Brown, the nation's outstanding lineman, and ably assisted by Dick Fouts, Mike Cacic and Mike Martin. Fleet-footed Willie Fleming again led the offense and reeled off one memorable 109-yard run against Edmonton.

Lions beat Calgary in the WFC final and were much healthier than when they played in the Grey Cup game the year previous. But their opponents were again the rough-tough Hamilton Tiger-Cats, led by bone-crusher Angelo Mosca.

The game was played in Toronto. This time the Lions won 34-24. Running back Bill Munsey played both ways and scored two sensational touchdowns that prompted the airport welcoming home party to shout "Munsey for Mayor". Quarterback Joe Kapp had thrown beautifully and Fleming reeled off one of his long touchdown runs. Even the field goal unit chipped in a touchdown. A dream had been realized.

1973 PREVIEW

The B.C. Lions look upon the 1973 football season as the year of maturity.

Head coach Eagle Keys has replaced many players during his first two years with the Lions. At the completion of the '72 season, no less than 24 new players had been added to the roster under Keys.

Thus the '73 season hopefully will be the beginning of many playoff seasons for the Lions. The coaching staff, backed by the administration, feels that the young players will come of age this season.

Keys, who made wholesale changes during the last two years in an effort to rebuild the Lions, plans to make even better use of key personnel this season. Take, for instance, Johnny Musso and Wayne Matherne.

Musso, perhaps the greatest running back ever at Alabama, will be moved to fullback this year. With the hash marks four yards closer to the centre of the field this season, Keys wants his fullback to be able to catch the football. As a rookie half-back last season, the injury-plagued Musso still caught 39 passes.

Matherne, a deadly tackler from his left corner position in his first two years with the Lions, will be moved to the safety position in training camp at Penticton. Matherne should be in on more of the action at safety, thus utilizing his talents even further.

Keys hopes to improve the passing game this year. Quarterback Don Moorhead still has wide receiver Jim Young (a club record 63 catches last year) and Musso to throw to, plus such impressive rookies as wide receivers Brock Aynsley and Ross Clarkson.

There should be more speed in the offensive backfield, with afterburners like Jefferson Inmon, Jim Massey and Jimmy Edwards fighting for halfback positions.

More beef has been added to the offensive line. Guard Travis Roach, a 260-pounder from the University of Texas, certainly has impressive credentials. Roach was a sixth-round draft choice of the New York Jets.

The defence is spearheaded by Ray Nettles at middle linebacker. A rookie last year, Nettles was named to the Western Conference and CFL all-star teams.

Tackle Garrett Hunsperger leads the rush up front, with plenty of support from end Mike Walker, who has the potential to develop into all-star material. Pressing the holdovers in the front four will be Bud Magrum, an All-Big-Eight selection in his first two years at Colorado.

Matherne is the key to the re-organized defensive secondary, along with Barry Ardern, obtained in a trade with Ottawa.

Maturity is the name of the game in '73, as the Young Lions strike out for a playoff berth in their 20th season.

LIONS VETERANS

GEORGE ANDERSON Linebacker (77)
B-12/30/48 6-3 230 Simon Fraser (NI) 3rd Year

Aggressive by nature, Anderson has been a starter for the Lions during his first two years. From North Vancouver, he was selected by the Lions during the supplementary draft in 1970. Scored a touchdown on a pass interception during his rookie season in '71. Has also played at defensive end.

BARRY ARDERN Defensive Back
B-5/12/46 5-11 185 Ottawa Juniors (NI) 6th Year

Acquired by the Lions, along with Gus Revenberg, during the off-season in a trade with Ottawa involving Jim Evenson. Ardern has the speed and toughness to be one of the best defenders in the Western Conference. Lions thought Ardern did best job last season of defending against B.C.'s Jim Young. Ardern also has considerable experience returning punts. Intercepted three passes last year.

CHIP BARRETT Defensive Back
B-8/10/44 6-2 190 University of B.C. (NI) 6th Year

Obtained by the Lions from Toronto last winter in exchange for Wayne Holm. Barrett has 17 lifetime interceptions in the CFL, including four last season while with the Argonauts. Drafted by Toronto in 1967, he was traded that year to Winnipeg for Dick Thornton. Returned to Toronto in 1970 as part of the Dave Raimey - Wally Gabler deal. Now makes his home in Surrey.

BRIAN DONNELLY Defensive Back (11)
B-11/3/48 5-11 180 Simon Fraser (NI) 3rd Year

Selected during the first round of the 1971 draft by Saskatchewan, Donnelly was then traded to the Lions for Archie McCord. Donnelly has been a starter during his first two years with the Lions, intercepting five passes each year. Makes his home in Coquitlam.

DAVE EASLEY Defensive Back (20)

B-7/12/47 5-10 185 Blue Bombers Jrs. (NI) 5th Year

A quarterback in junior football in Vancouver, Easley joined the Lions in 1969, starting at the safety position. Has been a regular ever since, although often bothered by knee injuries. Easley intercepted four passes last season and now has a lifetime total of 14, making him eighth on B.C.'s all-time list. Easley also doubles as an excellent punt returner.

TREVOR EKDAHL Offensive Guard (66)

B-4/3/42 6-2 235 Utah State (NI) 7th Year

Ekdahl is coming off perhaps his finest season with the Lions. Often bothered by injuries in earlier seasons, Ekdahl started all 16 games at right guard in 1972. One of the real "characters" in the game, Ekdahl took over as the Lions' player representative following the retirement of Ken Sugarman last winter. Ekdahl was named to the team for the CFL All-Star game this year in Hamilton.

MONROE ELEY Running Back (26)

B-4/17/49 6-3 210 Arizona State (I) 2nd Year

Eley dropped out of college a year early to join the Lions and promptly set a CFL record for kickoff returns — 37 for a record 1,033 yards. Eley rushed for 517 yards as a rookie, including a 75-yard touchdown run against Hamilton, the longest of the season in the CFL. Eley also caught 27 passes for 507 yards. Eley was the outstanding offensive player in the 1971 Peach Bowl. He was drafted in the 11th round by Kansas City in '73.

RON ESTAY Defensive Tackle (78)

B-12/22/48 6-1 240 LSU (I) 2nd Year

Second in the Outland Trophy voting in 1971, the Lions signed Estay after he was drafted in the eighth round by Denver. Quickness is Estay's strength as he gets off the ball with the best of them. As a rookie last season, Estay tied for the conference lead in fumble recoveries with three.

GREG FINDLAY Defensive End (79)
B-8/24/42 6-3 245 Wenatchee (NI) 12th Year

Findlay is the last remaining member of the Lions' Grey Cup championship team from 1964. Has played many positions for the Lions, including some outstanding years at linebacker. Was switched to defensive end last year and made remarkable progress during the second half of the season. Had a particularly outstanding game against Calgary at Empire Stadium, blocking a field goal attempt. Past president of the CFL Players Association.

GREG FINDLAY

BOB FRIEND Defensive Back (25)
B-4/4/50 5-11 185 Simon Fraser (NI) 2nd Year

Drafted in the third round of the 1972 CFL non-import draft, Friend became a starter in the ninth game and held the right corner position for the rest of the season. Friend holds the SFU record for pass interceptions, with nine in his senior year. Friend led the Lions in punt returns with 327 yards for a 6.4 average return.

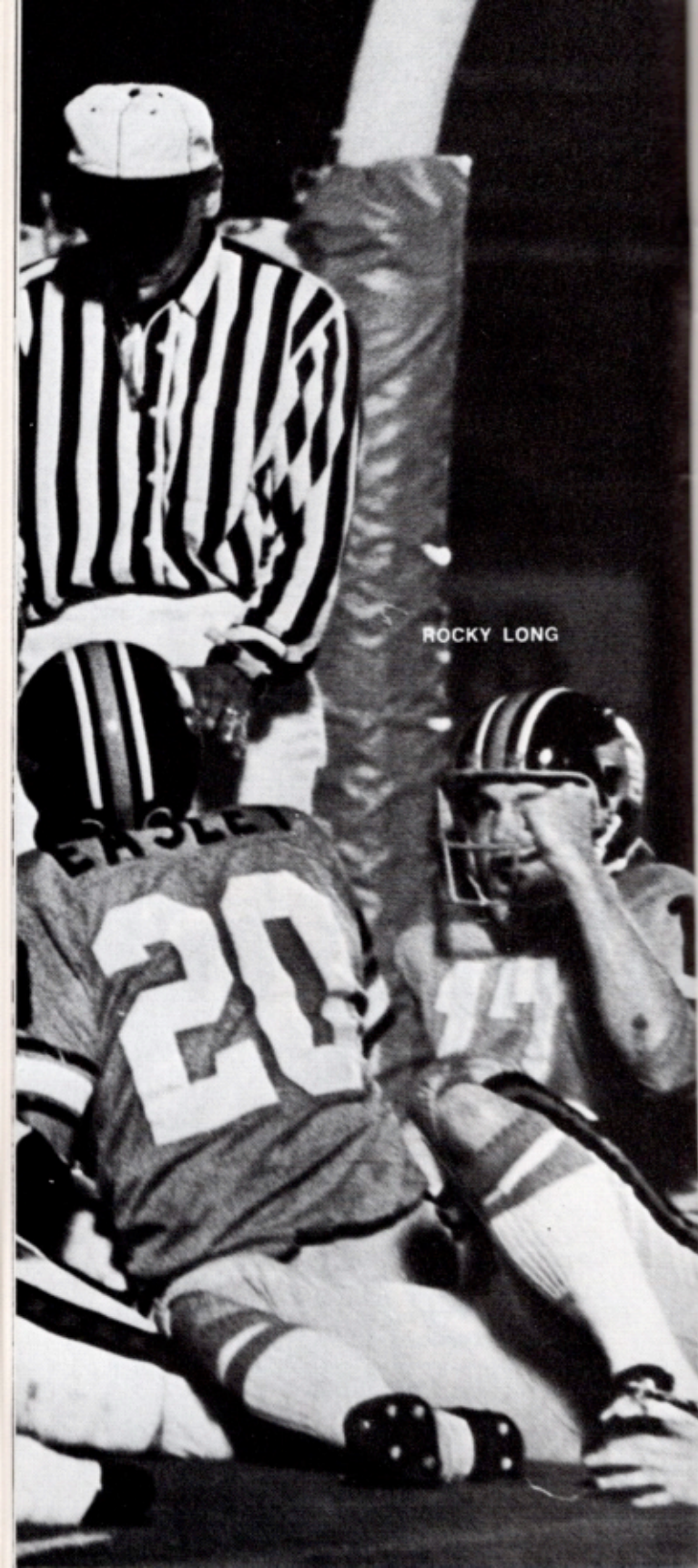
TED GERELA Running Back / Place-kicker (35)
B-3/12/44 5-10 205 Washington State (NI) 7th Year

The popular native of Powell River holds the CFL record for field goals in a single season — 30 in 1968. He has twice scored more than 100 points in a season, although he has never scored a touchdown. Gerela played defensive half in 1969 and developed a reputation as a hard hitter. Gerela now serves as a backup running back. He made a key third-down catch last year which contributed to a victory over Hamilton at Empire Stadium.

DAVE GOLINSKY Offensive Tackle (54)
B-6/13/47 6-4 245 Washington State (NI) 5th Year

A Vancouver native, Golinsky has been a starter the last three years. A tackle in college, he was tried at guard as a rookie in 1969, but was switched back to tackle the following year. Golinsky played in the '69 Hula Bowl game in Honolulu. He toured Latin American countries during the off-season.





ROCKY LONG

ERIC GUTHRIE Quarterback / Punter (14)
B-4/27/47 6-1 200 Boise State (NI) 2nd Year

This Vancouver native, who played junior football for the Meralomas before entering college, has an outstanding arm. He passed and kicked Boise State to the 1971 Camelia Bowl championship. In college he was called "The Canadian Rifle". Selected in the 14th round by San Francisco, Guthrie signed with the Lions and led the Western Conference in punting as a rookie last season, averaging 42.2 yards.

GARRETT HUNSPERGER Defensive Tackle (64)
B-10/8/46 6-3 255 Central Missouri 5th Year

One of the strongest players in professional football, Hunsperger has been plagued by knee injuries. When he's healthy, he's one of the best in the game. Hunsperger came to the Lions as a virtual unknown in 1969 and quickly developed into an excellent pass rusher. Has worked extremely hard during off-season to strengthen his legs.

MICHEL LEVEILLE Wide Receiver (34)
B-8/21/74 5-10 165 Ottawa University (NI) 3rd Year

Leveille missed the first half of the 1972 season because of a stress fracture of his right leg. Has very sure hands and has developed into a valuable return specialist. Leveille caught 13 passes last year after he became a starter late in the season.

ROCKY LONG Defensive Back (17)
B-1/27/50 5-10 175 New Mexico (I) 2nd Year

One of the most versatile players on the team, Long played running back, wide receiver, quarterback and defensive back as a rookie last year. He had three pass interceptions and returned one theft 43 yards. Long also was used as kickoff return man and showed that he has good speed. One of the real surprises of training camp '72.

WAYNE MATHERNE Defensive Back (15)

B-5/6/49 6-1 195 Northeast Louisiana (I) 3rd Year

Another one of those surprise players in training camp. As a rookie in 1971, Matherne led the Lions in pass interceptions with seven. He added two more pickoffs last year, when opposing teams gained much more respect for his area of the field at left corner. B.C. coaching staff has considered moving Matherne to safety, where his tackling ability may be more valuable.

DON MOORHEAD Quarterback (27)

B-10/11/48 6-3 210 Michigan (I) 3rd Year

Drafted in the sixth round by New Orleans in 1971, Moorhead selected the Lions because he would get a chance to play quarterback. Known more for his running ability in college, Moorhead has developed his passing skills during his first two years in the CFL. He started all but one game last season — and came on in relief of injured Don Bunce to lead the Lions to victory in the game he didn't start against Toronto.

JOHNNY MUSSO Running Back (22)

B-3/6/50 5-11 205 Alabama (I) 2nd Year

Another great catch for the Lions, Musso signed last season after one of the most outstanding college careers ever at Alabama. Famous for hitting quickly into the line, Musso was drafted in the third round by Chicago, but selected the Lions. He rushed for 405 yards as a rookie and caught 39 passes for another 556 yards. Musso played only parts of five games because of a foot injury. Musso will be switched to fullback this season.

RAY NETTLES Linebacker (51)

B-8/1/49 6-2 220 Tennessee (I) 2nd Year

Perhaps one of the greatest linebackers to come to the Canadian Football League in years. Nettles was selected to the All-Canadian team as a rookie in 1972 and named to the All-Star game team in Hamilton this year. Nettles was drafted in the sixth round by Miami, but wanted to play as a rookie and chose the Lions. Nettles had three pass interceptions as a rookie, but quickly became known for his hard hitting after moving to middle linebacker in the sixth game of the season.

DON MOORHEAD



GARY ROBINSON Defensive Tackle (67)
B-7/7/46 6-4 260 Simon Fraser (NI) 4th Year

Determined to be a starter this season, Robinson has put on considerable weight while training during the off-season. Has played mostly defensive end as a professional, but some feel he will do better inside at the tackle position. Always one of the best conditioned of the Lions, Robinson annually leads the linemen in their 12-minute pre-season run. He was drafted by Winnipeg, then signed as a free agent by the Lions.

MIKE WALKER Defensive End (69)
B-11/7/49 6-4 235 Tulane (I) 2nd Year

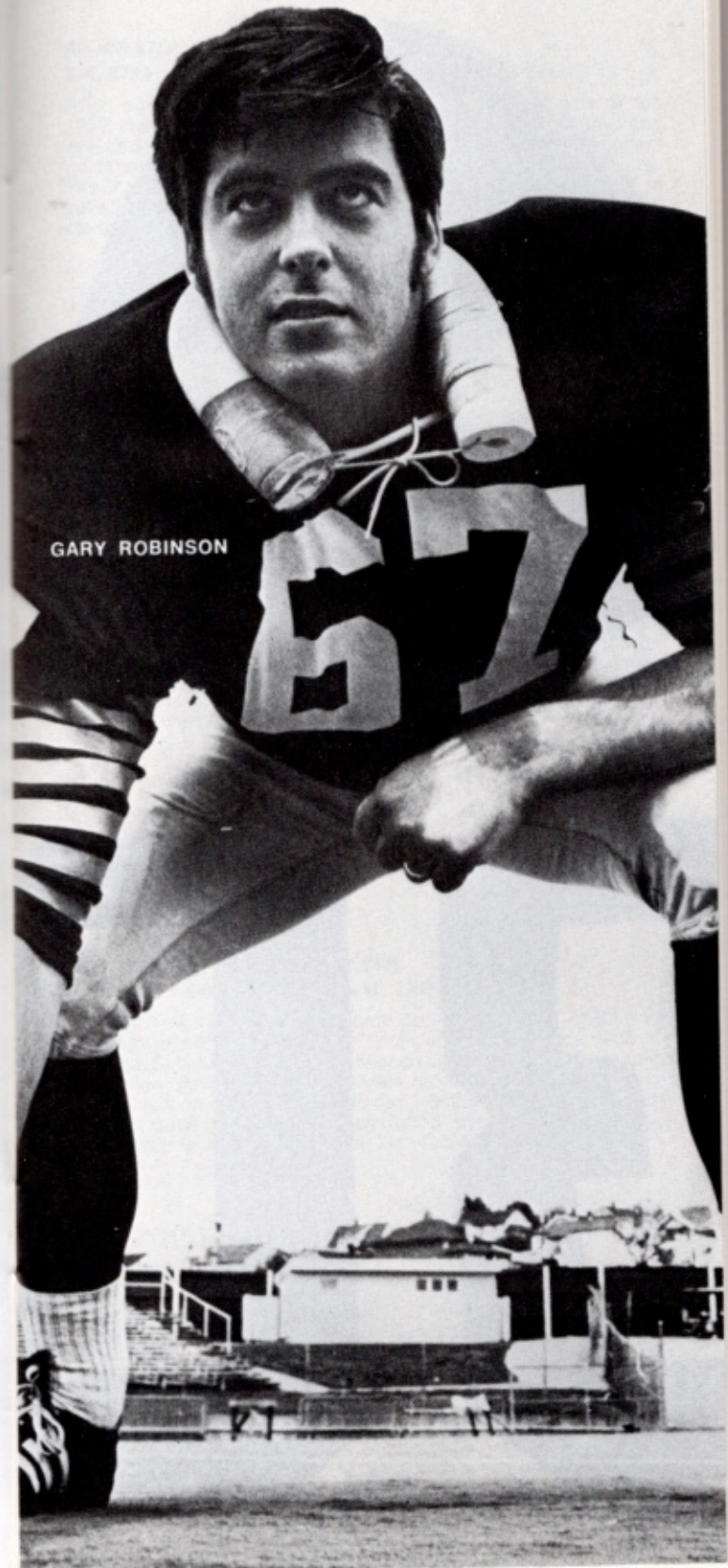
Former Lions' coach Jim Champion recommended B.C. take a look at Walker last season. Released by New Orleans, Walker came on strong with the Lions and developed into a dependable pass rusher. Although a little on the light side for the defensive line, Walker is quick and mean. Coaches hope he will play a little heavier this year.

CARL WEATHERS Linebacker (55)
B-1/14/48 6-2 220 San Diego State (I) 3rd Year

One of the quickest linebackers in the CFL, Weathers had injury problems last season. However, he showed that when he's healthy, he's a good one. Weathers came to the Lions late in the 1971 season and played middle linebacker. He started last season in the middle, but was injured and later moved to the outside. His hit on George Reed in the last game of the 1972 season was one of the best of the year.

TED WHEELER Offensive Guard (58)
B-9/16/45 6-3 250 West Texas State (I) 3rd Year

A knee injury cut down Wheeler in the seventh game of the 1972 season. He worked hard to strengthen the knee during the off-season. Wheeler came to the Lions midway through the '71 season and played both guard and tight end. Has excellent speed for an offensive lineman, particularly on the sweep. He's also an excellent basketball player.





AL WILSON Centre (52)

B-4/6/50 6-2 230 Montana State (NI) 2nd Year

After working as a backup guard during the first part of the 1972 season, Wilson moved in at centre in the 11th game and retained the position for the rest of the year. His excellent quickness makes him a valuable member of the offensive line. The Vancouver Island native was a defensive end and guard in college. Wilson is another graduate of the spring development camp.

MIKE WILSON Defensive Back (24)

B-11/19/46 5-11 195 Western Illinois (I) 3rd Year

One of the best defensive backs in the West, Wilson suffered a shoulder separation in the fifth game of the 1972 season. Still, he was selected to this year's all-star team for the Hamilton game. Wilson has exceptional jumping ability which enables him to get to the football in tight situations. Injured last year while returning a punt in Edmonton.

JIM YOUNG Wide Receiver (30)

B-6/6/43 6-0 195 Queen's U. (NI) 7th Year

The Hamilton native, who came to the Lions in 1967 from Toronto in exchange for Dick Fouts and Bill Symons, won his second Schenley Award last season as the CFL's outstanding Canadian player. Switched to wide receiver in 1972, Young set three club records: 63 receptions; 1,362 yards; and 11 touchdowns. Called "Dirty Thirty" by friend and foe, Young is currently writing a book about the fun side of football.

Protected in the CFL non-import draft in 1973 by the Lions. Played on the same high school football team in Coquitlam as Bob Currie, when Centennial won the Shrine Bowl. Rated an excellent pass protector.

BOB HALL Defensive End
B-10/6/48 6-11 260 Houston (NI)

Former basketball player who didn't play football until he attended Lions' training camp last season. Made remarkable progress playing in the Continental League at Indianapolis.

BOB HELMAN Running Back
B-2/9/50 6-1 195 North Dakota (NI)

Selected by the Lions in the second round of the 1973 CFL non-import draft, a choice acquired from Edmonton last season in a trade for Roy Shatzko.

JEFFERSON INMON Running Back
B-5/15/51 5-9 205 North Carolina Central (I)

May have the breakaway speed the Lions are looking for. Inmon has been timed at 4.45 seconds over 40 yards. Inmon was drafted in the 11th round by Los Angeles, but selected the Lions over the Rams.

DAVE KORCZYKOWSKI Offensive Tackle
B-8/1/51 6-4 250 Temple (I)

A big, strong offensive lineman who played more than one position in college. Has considerable experience at centre, but will be tried at offensive tackle by the Lions.

BUD MAGRUM Defensive Tackle
B-7/2/48 6-4 250 Colorado (I)

Elected to pass up his last year of college eligibility to sign with the Lions. Magrum was in the U.S. Marines for four years before enrolling in college. He was an All-Big Eight selection in both his soph and Junior seasons.

RANDY McDOUGALL Defensive Back
B-7/25/50 6-1 190 Weber State (I)

Drafted in the 12th round by Denver in 1972 and later released. Will be tried in the defensive backfield by the Lions. Also a wrestler in college.

LAYNE McDOWELL Offensive Tackle
B-8/12/49 6-4 250 Iowa (I)

Played four games with the Lions midway through the 1972 season, starting at offensive guard. Was released earlier last season by New England. He's a very smooth performer who may be best suited for the tackle position.

JIM MASSEY Running Back
B-5/24/48 6-1 205 Linfield (I)

A running back in college, Massey was drafted in the 11th round by Los Angeles in 1972 and tried at defensive back. Lions looked at him as a defensive back last season, then decided to bring him back this year as a running back.

CARLOS MATTHEWS Running Back
B-9/21/50 5-11 190 Kansas (I)

Dropped out of football two years ago when there was a coaching change at Kansas. His former coach, Pepper Rogers (now at UCLA), calls Matthews one of the best athletes he's ever coached.

RENARD PERKINS Defensive End
B-2/7/52 6-3 245 Cal-Riverside (I)

Known for his exceptional strength in college. Has played against Simon Fraser University.

BILL PULUTI Defensive End
B-3/15/49 6-3 255 Hawaii (I)

A native of Samoa, Puluti has exceptional strength. Lions tried to sign him two years ago when he was at Pasadena Community College.

JOHN QUINLAN Defensive Back
B-2/20/50 6-1 190 McMaster (NI)

Selected in the eighth round of the 1973 CFL non-import draft. A running back in college, this all-round athlete will be tried on defence.

TRAVIS ROACH Offensive Guard
B-3/18/50 6-3 260 Texas (I)

One of the big catches of the year. Roach was drafted in the sixth round by New York Jets in 1973, but selected the Lions. Has great strength. Could also get a look at offensive tackle.

TERRY SHARPE Offensive Guard
B-4/17/51 6-0 235 Simon Fraser (NI)

Lions took Sharpe in the sixth round of the 1973 CFL non-import draft. Sharpe is a New Westminster native.

EPHRAIM SMILEY Defensive End
B-3/17/50 6-4 230 Butler (I)

Played at Indianapolis of the Continental League last season with Bob Hall. Former Saskatchewan Roughrider Ken Carpenter recommended the Lions take a look at Smiley, who played tight end in college.

OZZIE SMITH Offensive Guard
B-4/1/51 6-3 240 Johnson C. Smith (I)

Another small-college player who will get a close look in training camp. Apparently is tough enough to play — if he has enough experience.

BRIAN SOPATYK Offensive Guard
B-5/31/47 6-2 235 Boise State (NI)

Lions made Sopatyk the No. 1 choice in 1973 in the CFL non-import draft. Saskatoon native played junior football for the Hilltops before enrolling in college.

TIM SULLIVAN Running Back
B-6/22/48 6-2 215 Iowa (I)

Selected in the ninth round by Minnesota in 1971. Sullivan had knee injury last season and was released. Will get a look at fullback and possibly tight end with the Lions.

AL THOMAS Defensive Back
B-7/7/49 5-11 180 Simon Fraser (NI)

Lions selected Thomas in the ninth round of the 1973 CFL non-import draft. Will get a look in the defensive backfield.

JOHN TURNER Tight End
B-Not available 6-5 220 Cal State Long Beach (I)

Lions tried to sign Turner a year ago after he was selected in the 11th round by San Diego. Has outstanding speed for the tight end position.

STEVE VOGEL Linebacker
B-6/1/50 6-6 230 Boise State (I)

Another player Lions tried to sign last year. Has great range for a linebacker and will be tried at an outside position.

SLADE WILLIS Wide Receiver
B-5/1/50 6-1 180 Drake (NI)

Lions drafted Willis in the first round of the 1973 CFL non-import draft, using a selection they obtained from Winnipeg last year in the Ray Lychak trade. Willis, from Edmonton, has good speed for a wide receiver.

JIM YANCEY Tight End

B-4/4/49 6-4 215 Florida (I)

Has outstanding speed for the tight end position. Once caught 40 passes as a junior in college. Sat out last season to try and put on more weight.

STEVE ZSAPKA Offensive Guard

B-3/20/48 6-0 250 Simon Fraser (NI)

Played all the pre-season games for the Lions last season. He was the Lions' No. 1 selection in the 1972 CFL non-import draft.

BILL MacGREGOR Wide Receiver

B-3/20/49 5-11 190 Simon Fraser (NI)

Selected by the Lions in the fourth round of the 1973 CFL non-import draft. Although over-shadowed by Ross Clarkson at SFU, MacGregor nevertheless was an effective college football player.

JIMMY EDWARDS Running Back

B-9/19/52 5-11 185 Northeast Louisiana (I)

Could be the breakway threat the Lions are looking for. Started his college career at the University of Oklahoma, but transferred to Northeast Louisiana in 1971. Edwards is a native of Oklahoma City.

LOU HARRIS Running Back

B-1/1/50 5-10 205 Southern California (I)

Harris was the Trojans' second-leading rusher in 1971, just a few yards behind Sam Cunningham, with 801. Drafted in the 17th round by Denver, Harris taxied until mid-season, when he asked and received his release.

The previous high was 36,659 on September 7, 1963 against Calgary, the Lions winning that game 37 - 21. The Lions' "One Millionth Fan Night" was against Edmonton, October 19, 1963. The Lions won 32 - 6. "Three Millionth Fan Night" was against Montreal, October 23, 1967. The Lions won, 30 - 20.

The largest crowd to watch a football game in Canada was the 39,417 at the November 26, 1955 Grey Cup game in Vancouver when Edmonton defeated Montreal Alouettes, 34 - 19.

Membership in the B.C. Lions Alumni Association will be limited to former players, coaches, executives, directors, governors and other personnel who were with the football club for one full season or more.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Attention, Doctors! It will NOT be possible to make announcements of a personal nature over the public address system. For that reason, persons expecting calls during the game are requested to report to the Stadium Office. All announcements will be made by numbers only. This notice especially is called to the attention of Doctors.

DOCTORS! YOU WILL BE PAGED BY YOUR M.S.A. NUMBER.

ST. JOHN AMBULANCE: First Aid Posts are situated on the West side of the Stadium, Tunnel D, Room 16 and on the East side, Tunnel Z, Room 40. These posts are staffed by qualified volunteer St. John Ambulance and Nursing personnel ready to assist you. Ambulance men stationed around the playing field are for service to the spectators and only attend to the players on the field if called for by the referee. They are also at the alley way of each tunnel.

AFTER THE GAME: (1) All cars parked North of the Stadium will be directed to Cassiar, Renfrew or Eton Street. (2) All cars parked West of the Stadium will be directed to Hastings or Renfrew Streets. (3) Cars parked South of Hastings Street will be directed to Rupert or Windermere Street.
