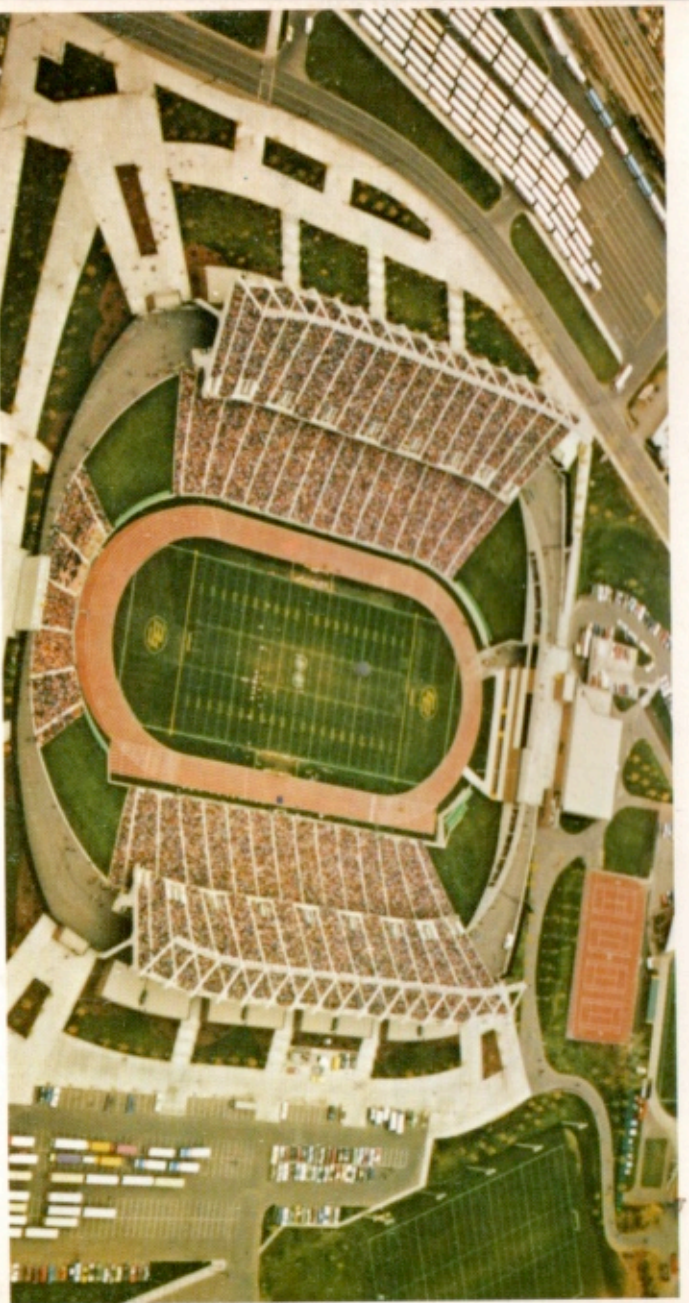

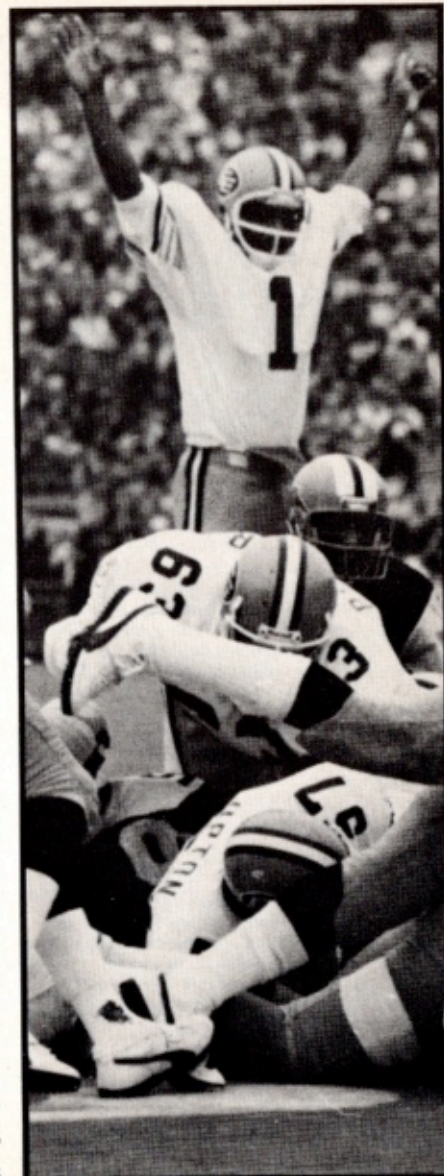

## The Eskimos!

The standard for a football team's greatness in Edmonton, the Canadian Football League, or anywhere else in sport, is three-in-a-row. With Grey Cup championships in 1978, 1979 and 1980, Edmonton Eskimos have equalled the three-in-a-row records of the 1954-55-56 Eskimos and the 1945-46-47 Toronto Argos and are in a position to create a new record of four-in-a-row.

The 1981 Eskimos have a chance to write some history. But, obviously, some history has previously been written.

While most faithful fans mark 1949 as the year when football drew its first breath in the city, Edmonton's gambols on the gridiron go back all the way to 1892, when a spur-of-the-moment rugby team challenged the already-established Calgary club to a game — and won. This historic victory was repeated in 1895 when Fort Saskatchewan, playing for Edmonton, and carrying several of the 1892 players on its roster, beat out Calgary for the first Alberta Rugby Football Championship.

But football really got its foothold in Edmonton in 1907 with its first import. "Deacon" White arrived from Chicago to play rugby and stayed to coach the Eskimos to their first Grey Cup Game in 1921. In between, the Edmonton team,

known as the Esquimaux, took the Alberta Championship from Calgary in 1908; became known as the Edmonton Eskimos in 1910; lost the Championship to Calgary in 1911 and 1912, regained it in 1913 in a final game in Red Deer to which 300 Edmonton fans travelled by special train. Football was suspended for the duration of the First World War, but in 1919 plans were set up once more for a four-team league and "Deacon" White took over the coaching reins. In 1920 such familiar names as Moe Lieberman at middle wing, Jimmy Enright at halfback, Punch Dickens, Miles Palmer, Ab Emery, Jimmy Bill and Art Creighton appeared on the players' list.

The first East-West Grey Cup Game was played in 1921. "Deacon" White coached his Eks to the Western Championship and the trip East to play the Toronto Argonauts, a game Eskimos lost 23-0. Undaunted, the team developed into such a powerhouse in 1922 that Calgary refused to play against it. The Eks returned to the Grey Cup gridiron again that year, this time losing 13-1 to Queen's University. It is an interesting footnote to Edmonton football that in the early days of the game, every player was on the field for the whole game, and in the words of one of the veterans, "You had to be dead before you were taken out."

Edmonton's luck started to run out in 1923 when they lost to Regina for the Western title, and in 1924, with the Alberta Championship loss to Calgary, the Eskimos folded up and weren't heard from again until 1928 when a senior team was again formed, with Eric Duggan and Cliff Shuttleworth two of its players. The Eks took the Alberta Championship from Calgary that year, and were the opposing team in 1929 when Canada's first forward pass was completed by Jerry Sieberling of the Calgary Tigers for a winning touchdown.

Cliff Shuttleworth took on coaching duties in 1930 and 1931. On the administrative side, Moe Lieberman was named President of the Alberta Rugby Union in 1929 and Western Canada Rugby Football Union President in 1932.

Re-organization began in the mid-thirties under the direction of a group including N.A. MacPhee, Ken Montgomery, Bob Bradburn, Art Carlson, Mel Wilson and Dr. Vic Lloyd, and in 1938 with the opening of Clarke Stadium and with the coaching prowess of Bob Fritz formerly with Winnipeg's Dominion Championship team, Edmonton entered the Boosters in the Western Canada Conference with Calgary, Regina and Winnipeg. That year Edmonton lost eight games, won one and didn't do much better until football was wrapped up for another war in 1940. Football activity in Edmonton lay dormant until December 28, 1948, when Ken Montgomery, Murray Montague, Bill Forester, Dr. Walter McKenzie, Joe Schoctor, Eric Duggan, Percy Daigle, Henry Singer, Walter Blake, Bob Bradburn and Moe Lieberman got together and formed the new Edmonton Eskimo Rugby Football Club as a public company with 20,000 shares at \$1.00 each. Annis Stukus was named Coach in February, 1949, and the following year took the Eks to the Western final, losing out to Winnipeg Blue Bombers in a two-game series. The Eskimos did a repeat performance in 1951, this time buckling to the Regina Roughriders.

Frankie Filchok did a one-year stint as Eskimo Coach in 1952 piloting Edmonton to the Dominion final where they lost to Toronto Argonauts 21-11 at Varsity Stadium. In 1952, the club also dropped "rugby" from its name, becoming the Edmonton Eskimo Football Club.

In 1953 Darrell Royal gave a season to the Eks along with the split-T, called the plays all the way to a western final scalping by Winnipeg's Indian Jack Jacobs. Edmonton half-back Billy Vessels took the first Schenley Award as most outstanding player for that year.

It was 1954 that marked the beginning of the football era that belonged to Edmonton. That was the year Frank "Pop" Ivy came to town with the twin-fullback system and that was the year Jackie Parker electrified every football fan in Canada by scooping up a last-minute Montreal fumble and romping 95 yards to tie the Grey Cup game. Bob Dean made good on the convert and Edmonton won its first Grey Cup championship. Eskies proved it wasn't a fluke in 1955, again taking the Cup home with them. In 1956, the two teams met in the classic for a third time in Toronto. Edmonton humiliated Montreal to the tune of 50-27 and "Pop" Ivy was named Coach of the Year.

Following the Eskimos' third Grey Cup victory over Montreal, Weekend Magazine ran a feature article enumerating the reasons why "the Eks can't be beaten." Ironically 1957, Winnipeg Blue Bombers did just that and went on to become Grey Cup champs.

Normie Kwong was the Schenley Canadian Player of the Year in 1955 and 1956. Jackie Parker took the Schenley Award as the most valuable player in the CFL in 1957 and 1958. He won the Jeff Nicklin Trophy as the most valuable player in the Western Conference seven times — six of them in successive years. Mike Lashuk was the Rookie of the Year in 1957 and Art Walker was the first winner of the Beckett-DeMarco Trophy as outstanding lineman in the West. In 1956 Don Getty was the first Canadian in a decade to quarterback his team to a Grey Cup victory. Johnny Bright was the first to win the Western ground-gaining crown three years in a row — 1957, '58 and '59. And in 1959 Johnny Bright was named the most valuable player in the CFL and Roger Nelson the top lineman for a two-out-of-three Schenley romp. In the first 10 years of the new era in Edmonton football, the Eskimos set 17 all-time Conference team marks, 11 in 1957 alone. In 1957 Keith Rolfe took over administrative chores as Secretary-Manager of the Club, replacing Al Anderson.

Sam Lyle, ex-Oklahoma Sooner, became head coach of the Eskimos for the 1958 season, resigning in May of '59 when Eagle Keys took over. The Eagle piloted his team to the Grey Cup again in 1960, where they lost out to Ottawa by a 16-6 score. Jackie Parker was a winner however, receiving Schenley's outstanding player award for the third time. Joe Ryan was named General Manager and the Eskimo team opened the first of its football clinics for fans.

In 1961 the Western Interprovincial Football Union became the Western Football Conference, and the first interlocking schedule between East and West divisions of the CFL was inaugurated. Norm Kimball was named coordinator of minor football for the club, and the Eskimo Alumni put up the Annis Stukus Trophy for the outstanding coach in Canadian football. Hamilton Ti-Cats' Jim Trimble was the first winner.

1962 and 1963, the Eskimo team was immersed in a rebuilding program and its scoreboard tally was less than impressive.

In 1964 however, Bill Mitchell of the Eskimos established a new CFL record for the longest field goal, kicking a 58-yarder in a game against Calgary. That record was broken in 1970 by another Esk, Dave Cutler, who booted a field goal 59 yards against Saskatchewan.

In 1964 under the presidential guidance of Walter H. Sprague, the Edmonton Eskimo Football Club scrapped its original "Articles of Association" in favour of a new, more explicit set of guidelines and a nine-man Board of Directors to administer the Club. In 1966, the Board of Directors named Norm Kimball General Manager. Kimball developed one of the most effective recruiting systems in the CFL.

Neill Armstrong replaced Eagle Keys as coach for the 1964 season, remaining with the Club until 1969, a year in which a Schenley Award came back to Edmonton with John LaGrone's selection as lineman of the year. It was during Neill Armstrong's tenure that Edmonton built up a formidable defence under the direction of Ray Jauch who replaced Armstrong as Coach in 1970. Jauch won the Coach of the Year honors in 1970, his first season.

Under Neill Armstrong the team made the playoffs four years out of six, but didn't make it to the final. Ray Jauch, in his four years to 1973, took the team to the playoffs three times, and the final and Grey Cup twice.

Edmonton's berth to the Grey Cup in 1973 marked the eighth time the City's team won the right to contest the classic in the Grey Cup's 64-year history. That year Eskimos' Dave Cutler established a CFL field goal record with 32 field goals. George McGowan tied a CFL record for pass receiving in a game against the Saskatchewan Roughriders and capped his performance by winning the Schenley Award as the most outstanding player of the year.

In 1974 the Eskimo football team enjoyed continued success, achieving a 10-5-1 record during the regular season and winning a bye into the final defeating Saskatchewan in the WFC final. Quarterback Tom Wilkinson was judged the Player of the Year, winning the Schenley Award. In the Grey Cup game itself, the Eskimos lost to the Montreal Alouettes in a torrential downpour in Vancouver.

For the third year in a row in 1975 the Eskimos, with a 12-4-0 record, won the Western Conference Championship. This time however they defeated Montreal in the national final.

Eskimos slipped to third place in 1976, but again met Saskatchewan in the Western Conference final. This time losing.

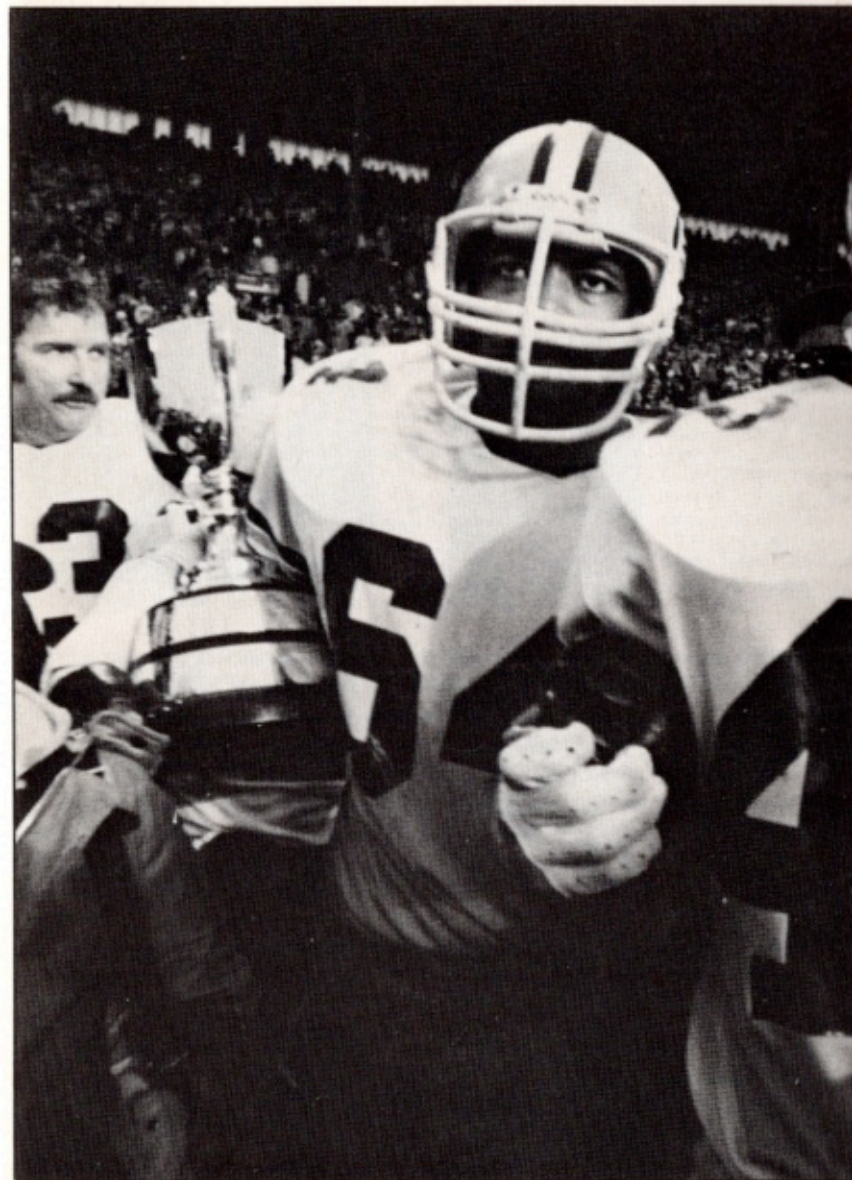
Hugh Campbell was named head coach in 1977. The Eskis beat B.C. Lions in the WFC final, but were defeated by the Montreal Alouettes in the Grey Cup in Montreal. Dan Kepley was awarded the Schenley Award for Outstanding Defensive Player.

In 1978 Coach Hugh Campbell led the Eskis to a win over the Stampeders in the WFC final and defeated the Montreal Alouettes to win the Grey Cup in Toronto. Dave Fennell was awarded the Schenley Award for Outstanding Defensive Player.

And the Eskimos, of course, took Calgary in the Western final and won the Cup over Montreal again in 1979 as Brian Kelly won Schenley rookie honors, Dave Fennell took the top Canadian award and Mike Wilson was named top offensive lineman. The 1979 team rolled up an awesome total of 495 points (the average score at home was 39-10) and equalled the 1957 team with the dent they made in the record book. But most important, the Eskimos set up a chance for three-in-a-row. And an opportunity to write some more history.

And write that history they did in 1980. They defeated the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the Western Playoff and defeated the Hamilton Ti-Cats in the Grey Cup to win the Cup three years in a row. Dale Potter was named Outstanding Defensive and Canadian Player of the Grey Cup, and Warren Moon was picked as Offensive Star of the game.

Dan Kepley again won the Schenley Award, in 1980 for Outstanding Defensive Player and Mike Wilson was named top Offensive Lineman.



**JACK McMAHON**  
PRESIDENT



Elected President of the Edmonton Eskimo Football Club at the annual meeting in January, 1981, Jack McMahon is following in the footsteps of his father, "Red" McMahon, who served as President of the Eskimos in 1962 and '63. Elected to the Board in 1976, Jack served as Treasurer from 1977 through 1980. He is a member of the Board of Governors of the Canadian Football League. A native Edmontonian, McMahon received his Bachelor of Commerce Degree from the University of Alberta and is a partner of the firm Clarkson Gordon, Chartered Accountants. He served as a member of the Council of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Alberta from 1974 to 1980 and as president in 1979 and 1980. He also served as a member of the Board of Governors of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants from 1978 to 1980. An ardent golfer, McMahon is married and has three sons and a daughter.

The Edmonton Eskimo Football Club is a community owned organization, controlled by a nine-man Board of Directors elected by the Shareholders. They are dedicated to advancing and operating professional football in Edmonton.

**DALLAS GENDALL**

Deputy Minister of Development and Trade of Economic Development. Formerly associated in the building supply industry. Born in Manor, Saskatchewan, attended high school there and Luther College in Regina. Elected to the Eskimo Board of Directors in 1977.



**DON CARLSON**

President of the Club for the past two years, Don was elected to the Board of Directors in 1973 and continues to serve. He is president of Carlson Construction, President of Trade-winds Travel, Director of Princeton Developments, a Board member of National Trust and the Alberta Motor Association.



**DONALD F. BAKER**

Vice-President, Engineering with Numac Oil and Gas. Since 1964, Don was Senior Petroleum Engineer with Pan American Petroleum Corporation from 1955 to 1964. A graduate of the University of Alberta with a B.Sc in Petroleum Engineering in 1951, Don served in the Canadian Army from 1941 - 46.



**DOUG MONTGOMERY**

Director and General Manager of Travel World Consultants, and President of Sterling Finance Corporation. Elected to the Board in 1978. A native Edmontonian long involved in sports activities.

Former hockey player with the Waterloo Mercuries which represented Canada in the 1948 Olympic Games. Now president of Waterloo Mercury. In his fourth year on the board.



**DR. REX BOAKE**

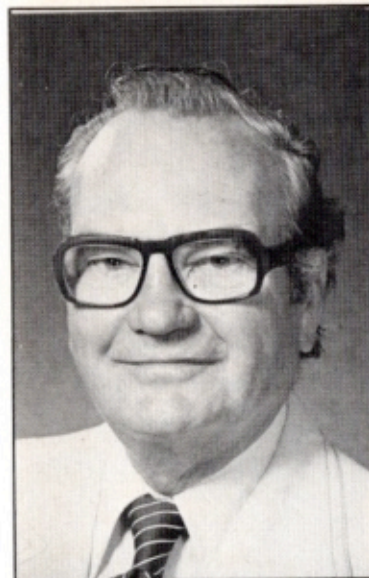

## ESKIMO MANAGEMENT

### **NORM KIMBALL** EXECUTIVE MANAGER



Recognized as one of the top professional sports executives in Canada, Norm Kimball is in his 18th season as head of the Edmonton Eskimos' management structure. A senior executive in the Canadian Football League, Kimball was General Manager of the team for 12 years when he was appointed to the position of Executive Manager in November of 1976. Kimball is responsible to the President of the Board of Directors for all operations of the football club. When he became general manager Kimball had what would now be called a skeleton front office. Under his leadership the Eskimos now have one of the complete organizations in the CFL, complete with five coaches, a director of player personnel, a full-time United States scout, a special projects manager, a marketing manager and a director of media relations. With seven Grey Cup appearances in the last eight years, including four Grey Cup victories as well as the best win-loss record in the CFL in the 70s, Kimball has more than proven himself. A native Edmontonian, Kimball acted as minor football co-ordinator of the team in 1961. From that position, he moved up to office manager, to assistant general manager and to general manager within five years. Well known in U.S. pro and college circles, Kimball developed a scouting system which has been recognized as one of the best in the Canadian Football League. A one-time winner of Edmonton Sportsman of the Year honors, Kimball has also been recognized for his strong leadership on a number of league standing committees and as the chairman of the players relations committee which has played a key role in negotiating three agreements with the Canadian Football League Players Association during the past nine years.



### **QUINCY MOFFAT** SPECIAL PROJECTS

One of the reasons the Eskimos are recognized as one of the top organizations in the Canadian Football League, Quincy Moffat is in his 15th year with the club. Well known to all media personnel around the league, Moffat has performed in all areas of administration, promotion, public relations, press information, publications, ticket sales under his previous all encompassing job of Office Manager. In his current position of Manager of Special Projects, Moffat devotes his time to developing new promotions and projects and is responsible for special Eskimo functions such as the Molson's Western Football Conference "Skywriters" training camp tour, the \$150-a-plate dinner, the Canadian Football League Coach of the Year Dinner, Miss Grey Cup Contest and all Eskimo half-time shows. He is also responsible for all Eskimo publications.



### **DAVE WILLIAMS** MARKETING MANAGER

Once the Edmonton Air Canada representative who acted as traveling secretary on Eskimo road trips, Dave Williams signed on with the Eskimos five years ago as marketing manager of the CFL club. Williams is responsible for promotion, development and administration of ticket sales. Williams completed the computerization of all seating in Commonwealth Stadium. A virtual sellout situation and a long waiting list leave Williams with enviable problems. An employee of Air Canada in Edmonton for 19 years, Williams brought to the club a broad background in sales and public relations. He joined Air Canada in 1958 and in 1972 he became sales representative responsible for sports traffic. In 1976 Williams was elevated to the position of sales and reservations manager of Air Canada in Edmonton.

## FRANK MORRIS

### PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Frank Morris is the only person in the Canadian football history to have a triple crown of triple crowns. The man in charge of Eskimo Canadian Content is the only man who has played for two teams who have won three consecutive Grey Cups and has been involved with another. Morris played for the 1945-46-47 Toronto Argonauts Grey Cup winners and for the 1954-55-56 Eskimos Grey Cup teams. He's been in 14 Grey Cup games as a player and executive and ten times he's come out a winner. A member of the Eskimos staff since 1970, Morris was appointed Director of Player Development in 1973. His duties include control of all scouting material, scouting of Canadian players and administrative functions related to personnel.



## RAY NEWMAN

### U.S. SCOUT

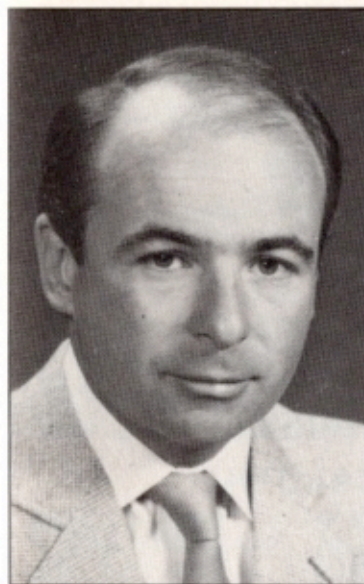
In 1978 Eskimos decided to hire a full-time United States scout. Ray Newman — three-for-three in Grey Cups — has obviously enjoyed success. Well known in Western U.S. pro and college football circles, Ray Newman came to the Eskimos with 12 years of pro scouting background. Newman was with the NFL New Orleans Saints as Western U.S. pro scout from 1966 to 1970 and with the NFL San Diego Chargers from 1971 to 1978. Newman's background includes two years at Boise Junior College and two years at Idaho State where he graduated with a B.A. He then attended Fresno State where he received his masters degree. Deciding to pursue a coaching career, Newman was head coach at Sanger (Calif.) High School where he remained for five years and then moved to Bakersfield Junior College where he was head coach for 10 years.



## ALLAN WATT

### MEDIA RELATIONS

Allan Watt joined the Edmonton Eskimo Football Club last year in the newly created position of media relations director. A veteran CBC sportscaster, Watt worked with CBC Edmonton from 1970 to 1978. After a brief stint as an owner of a men's wear business in Calgary, he joined the sports department of CBC Calgary in 1979. A graduate of Bonnie Doon high school in Edmonton, Watt also graduated from the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology, graduating in radio and television arts in 1969. He worked two years in production at CBC before becoming a member of the sports department in 1972. Watt has covered the Canada Summer and Winter Games, the Olympic Games, Pan-Am Games, and Commonwealth Games. He is a former secretary of the Edmonton Sports Reporters Association.



## JIM ADAMS

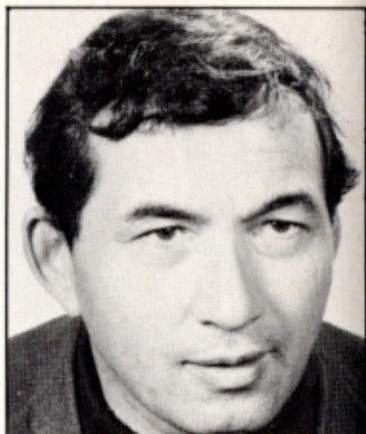
### HEAD TRAINER

After three consecutive years of virtually injury-free play, Edmonton Eskimos players swear by "The Iceman" as head trainer Jim Adams is known as a result of his use of ice as an injury prevention treatment. Adams was appointed to the position of trainer by Hugh Campbell shortly after Campbell was named head coach of the club in 1977. Adams was head trainer and equipment manager at Whitworth College with coach Campbell from 1972 to 1976 and he impressed Campbell to the extent the coach insisted on bringing him to Edmonton. Adams received a B.A. in Psychology from Whitworth, has NATA certification and is a member of the National and Canadian Athletic Trainers Association. Married, Adams is not new to the Canadian Football League having been a guest trainer with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in 1974, 1975 and 1976.



**TOM PON**  
EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Joining the Eskimo Staff in 1966 as Assistant Trainer, Pon was appointed Head Trainer in 1970. In 1974 he required open heart surgery and for the next three years in his recovery period spent his time as training advisor and equipment supervisor. 1978, Pon returned to full time duties as Equipment Manager. Prior to joining the Eskimos Staff, he served two seasons with the University of Alberta Golden Bears football team on the training staff.

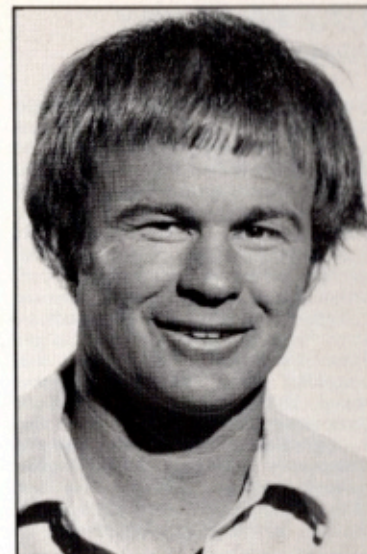

**HUGH CAMPBELL**  
HEAD COACH

Coach of the Year in the CFL in 1979, Hugh Campbell went into 1980 with 37 wins, 13 losses and four ties, second only to Pop Ivy's 50-14-0. He has taken the Esks to the Grey Cup game in each of his four years as head coach, winning three. He played in the Grey Cup games of 1966, 1967 and 1969, his last three years in the league as a player. In that he did not play in 1968, Campbell has been in the last seven Grey Cup games in which he has been in the league. No stranger to the CFL, he was an outstanding player with the Saskatchewan Roughriders from 1963 to 1969. He was a guest coach at the Winnipeg and Saskatchewan training camps from 1973 to 1976. Climaxing an outstanding college football career at Washington State as a receiver in 1962, Campbell played in the East-West Shrine game, the Hula Bowl and the Coaches All-America game. Drafted by the San Francisco 49ers in 1963, he was signed by the Saskatchewan Roughriders and became one of the leading receivers in CFL history with 60 touchdown passes caught in a six-year career, including 17 in 1966. With a coaching career in mind, Campbell worked with the Washington State coaching staff at their spring training camp during his years as a CFL player. In 1968 the opportunity arose to join the Washington State staff as an assistant coach. Although he was at the top of his game as a player, he elected to pursue his ambition to coach. Two years later he was appointed head coach at Whitworth College in Spokane, taking over a football program which was almost extinct. In two years he built a winning team and in his last five years Whitworth won 67 per cent of their games competing against larger schools. Campbell was elected Coach of the Year in the Pacific Northwest Conference three times.

## **CAL MURPHY** OFFENSIVE COACH

Offensive coach Cal Murphy has now been to four consecutive Grey Cup Games and won four straight. An Assistant with the 1977 Grey Cup champion Montreal Alouettes, Murphy joined the Esks in 1978 and won three more. Cal brought more than 20 years of coaching experience with him to the Eskimos, including two years ('75-'76) as head coach of the B.C. Lions. Born in Manitoba, Cal grew up in Vancouver and eventually became a quarterback at UBC. Later he was converted to a defensive back with the B.C. Lions in 1956. His coaching career began in Vancouver at Notre Dame High School ('56-'59) and Vancouver College ('60-'64). He served as an assistant at Eastern Washington University ('65-'67), the University of Hawaii, Hawaii ('68-'72) and San Jose State ('73) before returning to the CFL and the B.C. Lions as an assistant in 1974.



## **BRUCE LEMMERMAN** OFFENSIVE COACH

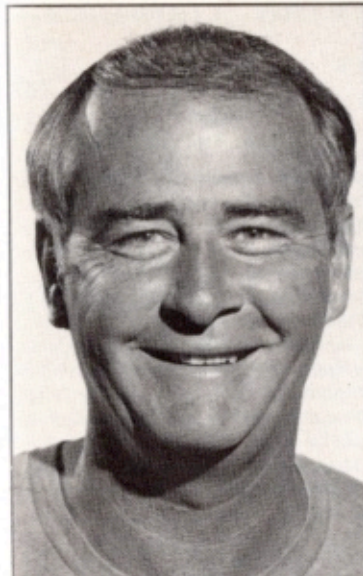
Appointed to the Eskimo coaching staff this year, Bruce brings to the Club thirteen years of experience as a professional quarterback, nine with the Eskimos. During 1977, '78 and '79, he worked closely with the coaches, analyzing game films and offensive plays.

A four year college career at San Fernando State College brought him two honorable mention All-American Awards and a free agent shot as quarterback with the Atlanta Falcons of the National Football League. He played for the Falcons three years. Signed by the Eskimos in mid-season, 1971 Bruce was a key factor in the turning of the Eskimos from a sad sack team of the 60's into the success story they've been in the 70's. Traded to Hamilton last year, Bruce played into the mid-season when he received an arm injury and retired. Bruce and his wife Brigitte have two daughters, Lisa 9 and Jennifer 8.



## **DAN DANIEL** DEFENSIVE COACH

Clarence Dan Daniel has a perfect three-for-three record as an assistant coach with the Eskimos, having joined the team in 1978. But it was a long and winding road he followed before coming to Edmonton. His extensive coaching career goes back to 1955 when he joined the coaching staff of Custer (ND) High School. Four years later he moved to Worland (Wy.) High School. He began his college coaching career at University of Wyoming in 1962 as a varsity scout while doing graduate work. He left Wyoming after the 1964 season to put in one year at MacAlester College in Minnesota then four years at Colorado State, one year at the United States Naval Academy and a year at the University of Wyoming followed. In 1971, Daniel was appointed defensive backfield coach at the University of Houston and remained there until he joined the Eskimos.



## **DON MATTHEWS** DEFENSIVE COACH

Don joined the Eskimos when Hugh Campbell did in 1977. He came to the Edmonton job directly from a High School coaching job and is now entering his fifth year as the coach of the defensive front 7 of the Edmonton Eskimos. He has 17 years of coaching experience. Following four years as a player at the University of Idaho, Matthews started coaching at the High School level in Nevada. Moving to Spokane, Washington the following year, he established a program which led to a Spokane High School Championship. Don was then appointed assistant coach at the University of Idaho and he remained with his alma mater for four seasons before accepting a position as head coach at Sunset High School in Portland, Oregon. At Sunset, Don's team won two State High School Championships.

Every time Dave kicks a field goal, it's another pro football record. Cutler finished the season just 322 points shy of Blanda's record point total of 2,002, so it's conceivable he could break that mark within early in 1983. He is tops in the

CFL in field goals and career points as well as most points in a single season (195), most field goals in a single season (50) and has twice tied the CFL record for most field goals in a single game (6). He also has the longest field goal in CFL history, 59 yards. Cutler was Edmonton's number one draft choice in 1959, but signed with the Green Bay Packers instead.
