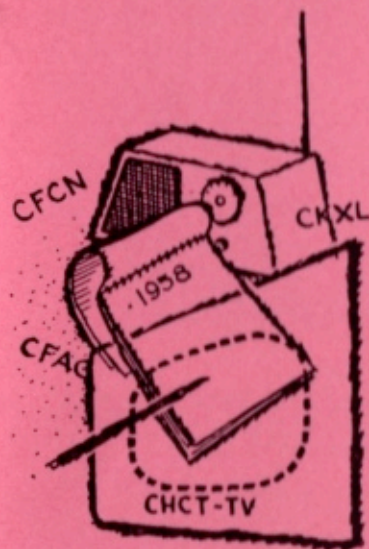

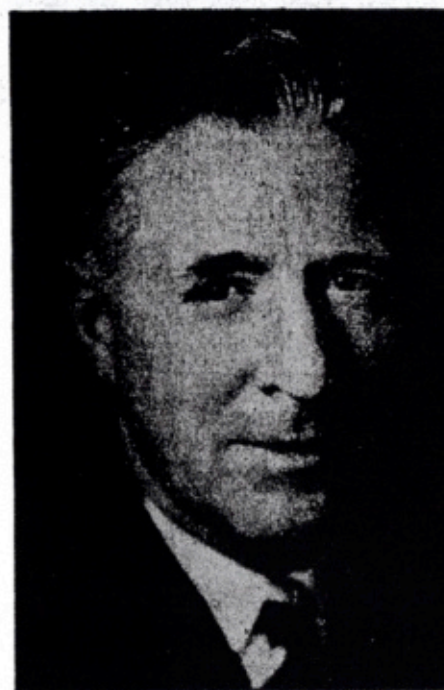

MERVIN (RED) DUTTON

Mr. Dutton received his education in Winnipeg, Manitoba, at St. John's College. While still in his youth he went overseas with the P.P.C.L.I., where he served with distinction until he was wounded at Farbers Wood.

He began his hockey career with Calgary in the Big-Four Hockey League in 1922, moved to the Montreal Maroons in 1926, the New York Americans in 1930. After 14 brilliant years of playing, Mr. Dutton became manager of the New York Americans. After one year as Acting-President of the National Hockey League he became President for the 1944-45 season at which time he resigned to return to the contracting business.

Mr. Dutton entered the business world with the same vigor with which he played hockey, and is associated with some sixteen companies in an executive capacity.

"Red" is very active in clubs and societies and still has time to take an active interest in golf, hunting, baseball, hockey and, of course, football, and is a member of Calgary's Old Time Hockey Players' Association. In April of 1958, Mr. Dutton was elected to Canada's Hockey Hall of Fame.

JAMES E. FINKS

Born in St. Louis, Missouri, Jim attended high school in Salem, Illinois and graduated from Tulsa University in 1949. Jim played two seasons of pro baseball in Texas and S. Carolina. He joined Pitts Steelers of the NFL in the fall of 1949, was with them for seven years and during that time he became their regular T-formation and No. 1 quarterback. During the off season he was affiliated with Franklin Life Insurance Co. in Pittsburgh.

At the end of the 1955 season he was contacted by Notre Dame and accepted the position of backfield coach. The Calgary Stampeders contacted him at the end of the 1956 season and he joined the Club as assistant coach and chief talent scout. Jim became G.M. of the Stampeder Football Club in November, 1957. He is married to the former Maxine Stemmons of Tulsa, Oklahoma and has three boys.

HEAD COACH



OTIS W. DOUGLAS JR.

Otis was born in Readville, Virginia, one of a family of ten. He graduated in Physical Education from the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia, and played guard and tackle in his college football days. After receiving a Doctorate degree in Education and Masters in Art, he was assistant coach at his Alma Mater for seven years. From there he went to the University of Akron, serving as Athletic Director until 1942.

For the next three years, Otis was in the Navy where he coached with Jim Tatum and played at Jacksonville Naval Air Station. He played three years with the Philadelphia Eagles who won the World Championship in 1948-49. From here, his coaching duties took him to Drexel Tech., University of Arkansas (in the tough Southwest Conference), Baltimore Colts and the Chicago Cardinals where he was defensive coach and then to Villanova University. He left Villanova during the 1956 season to accept the Head Coaching job with the Stampede.

Coach Douglas is married and has two children, Eleanor 12, and Otis Jr., 17 years of age. Their home is in Hague, Virginia, where such businesses as Pheasant and Oyster farming and running a resort keep him busy in the off-season. A great asset to these careers is his flying ability, as he has been an aviator for nineteen years.

ASSISTANT COACH



TOMMY THOMPSON

Born in Hutchison, Kansas, Tommy played his college football at Tulsa University in Oklahoma. In 1939 and 1940 he played with Pittsburgh of the N. F. L. - moved to the Philadelphia Eagles in 1941 and 1942, then joined the U. S. Army to serve in Europe. On his discharge in 1944, he rejoined the Eagles at Quarterback for six successful years. During this time, he helped the Eagles win the Eastern Division in 1947 and the World Championship in 1948-49.

Tommy began as backfield coach of Arkansas University for the 1951-52 seasons and held the same position with the Chicago Cardinals in 1954 and 1955. The year between these coaching positions, 1953, he was playing-coach with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the W. I. F. U.

Tommy holds records that still exist in the N. F. L. For championship playoffs he threw the most passes (44) and completed the most (27). He holds practically all lifetime passing records of the Eagles.

Tommy and his wife Dodie make their home in Jordan, Arkansas, where they have a vast ranch of cattle and thousands of heads of horses.

THE QUARTERBACK CLUB

The Quarterback Club consists of all season ticket holders as well as others who wish to pay a \$1.00 annual fee. At present, this group has a membership of approximately 3,000, elects its own directorate and executive, and operates as a service club to the football club. The Quarterback Club conducts open meetings during the football season through which the football executive and coaches report to the public. It also stages activities to promote ticket sales, conducts all entertainment at the football games and nominates one of the ten directors of the football club. The purpose of Calgary's cheerleaders is to add color and atmosphere to the Stampeder home games, and this enthusiastic group devotes three nights a week during football season to practicing novel routines which are very favorably received by the fans. As in the past, the cheerleaders plan to support the team by making several road trips to other football cities.

HISTORY OF STAMPEDE FOOTBALL CLUB LTD.

They have been known by many names — The Tigers, the 50th Battalion, the Altomahs, the Bronks and, of course, the Stampede.

The Calgary Football Stampede have fought evil days the past few years, but the history of the Club, going way back to 1908, is steeped in firsts.

Like the old Tigers of 1911. They won the Western Canada championship. And in 1912, the Calgarys introduced a new, streamlined style of football by eliminating the two flankers on either side of the centre to make for 12 man football. Joe Price, a teacher at Calgary's Central High School, instituted the change and the seniors quickly went along.

This was the era of Squib Ross, Bull Ritchie, Archie McTeer and Jack Fraser. Many memorable battles with Deacon White's Edmonton Eskimos took place down the years, but the Tigers called it quits in 1923 and the 50th Battalion took over. A few seasons and the Altomahs, with Hal Lewis at the reins, took a fling and they in turn bowed out in favor of the Tigers again.

Another first took place in 1929 when a Drake University import by the name of Gerry Seiberling, came north to join the Tigers as quarterback. He astounded the Canadian Football world one afternoon by dropping back and firing the ball downfield to teammate Russ Gideon. Gideon caught it and this was the first forward pass thrown in Canada. The weapon eventually became the most feared method of destruction in our game.

The Calgary Bronks took over in the early 30's and a stocky quarterback from Notre Dame by the name of Carl Gronin came on to do the coaching. He had some pretty fair hands to work with in the persons of Dick Haughian, Ed Rorvig, the Harrisons, Les Ferguson, Willard Bisbing and Al Hoptowitz.

But through all these years, a Grey Cup never came to the City of the Foothills.

It never came in the immediate post war years when the ol' leg-chewer, Dean Griffing, was hired to coach the co-op Stampede. Griffing, however, couldn't find the right formula and in 1948 a gentleman by the name of Tom Brook came charging into the picture.

Brook found the 1947 payroll came to a staggering \$4,700. He threw this budget out of the window and hired Les Lear to do the coaching and reputedly paid Large Lester something like eight grand to do the job.

He told Lear to go out and hire a ball club and Les did just that. He got a couple of Honolulu Warrior stars in the persons of Keith Spait and John Aguirre and added a pass catching wizard by the name of Woody Strode. Chuck Anderson, a centre, was the only other import besides Lear himself. Then Lear hit the Canadian ranks. Paul Rowe was the human battering ram and he had support from fellows like Red Pantages, Ced Gyles, Pete Thodos, Cliff Kleiwer, Fred Wilmott, Bill Wasyk, Harry Hood and an old-timer by the name of Frits Hanson.

The line stalwarts were fellows like Bill Pullar, Aubrey Anderson, Baldy Tomlinson, Dave Berry, Bert Iannone, Rube Ludwig, Steaky Adams, Chick-Chickowski and Normie Hill.

The crew waltzed through the Western League without a single defeat and it was on to Toronto for the Grey Cup game against the Ottawa Roughriders. Calgary fans, on their famous special, whooped it up so much in Toronto that the Grey Cup festival as we know it today, was born. The parade and all the other shindigs, grew out of that 1948 visit. The Stamps fooled the experts in the game as well, beating the favored Roughies to bring the Grey Cup to Calgary for the first time.

It was the same the next year. The Cowboys lost but one game in 13 in the west and then went east to meet the Montreal Alouettes for the title. However, Frankie Filchuck and his Larks were ready and the Stamps went down fighting.

Since that time, the Stampede have been in, or near the basement. After Lear was fired in 1953, Bob Snyder came on to do the coaching. Then it was Larry Siemering and Jack Hennezier and now, Otis Douglas.

There have been quite a few notables on the roster in the past few seasons: John Henry Johnson, Frankie Albert, Johnny Bright, Eddie LeBaron, Gene Brito, Howard Waugh, Dick Huffman, Dou Klosterman, Bill McKenna, Earl Lunsford, Harry Langford, Porky Brown, Lynn Bottoms, Jack Gotta, Jim Finks and Floyd Harwood, to mention a few. Yet, the Stamps have not been able to reach the heights of '48.

Douglas and Tommy Thompson got them fired up a bit in 1957, however, and for the first time since '52, the Stamps made the playoff grade. They lost to the Blue Bombers in the semi-finals, but not before a great battle.

Otis figures he has plugged some of the holes this year and while no one has had the temerity to suggest Grey Cup, the picture is brighter than it has been for years.

Toronto fans are praying it will be soon. They remember the fun of 1948 and 1949.
